

CARDS GO HOME WITH TEN GAME LEAD OVER ALL

Streetmen Will Point for Series With Athletics in October — Plan Batting and Pitching Practice

By Gayle Talbot. (Associated Press Sports Writer) Homebound today after their last triumphant tour of the Atlantic seaboard, the St. Louis Cardinals were in position to concentrate on getting themselves in prime condition for their October skirmish with the Philadelphia Athletics.

By sweeping their closing doubleheader with the Boston Braves yesterday, the Streetmen closed their western invasion with a record of 13 victories in 17 starts against the Giants, Phillies, Robins and Braves. They were returning to their own back yard with a lead of 10 games over the field, sufficient to permit them to coast through the final month. It is just what Gabby Street asked for.

Will Drill Pitchers

From here on according to reports, the Red Birds' pilot intends to give his men plenty of hitting practice against the American league ball and to devote considerable time to drilling his pitchers on the weaknesses, if any, of the Athletic swarms.

Two veterans of the birds' pitching staff completed the sweep of the five-game series at Boston yesterday. Jim Haines keeping 10 hits scattered to win the first, 6 to 1, and Burleigh Grimes taking the nightcap, 6 to 4.

Thanks to some lusty hitting by Hazen Cuyler and Manager Hornsby, the Chicago Cubs were able to close their eastern jaunt with a pair of victories over the Giants, 4 to 3, and 7 to 4, the second going 12 innings.

Phils Take Two

The Phillies showed Dan Howley's Cincinnati Reds a little deeper into the cellar with a pair of beatings, 3 to 4 and 7 to 5.

Although they dropped the final to St. Louis, 9 to 5, the Athletics showed a nice profit for their last western tour, winning 10 and losing only 4. They were back east today with a 14 1/2 game lead over their closest American league rivals, the Washington Senators.

Roy Johnson's homerun in the eighth was the punch the Detroit Tigers needed to nose out the Senators, 5 to 4, in their last meeting of the year.

After losing 10 straight to the New York Yankees at Comiskey park this year, the Chicago White Sox finally broke through to win their home tilt, 8 to 5.

Boston's scheduled doubleheader at Cleveland was rained out.

DEMPSEY PLAYS WITH BIG HAMS IN SEATTLE RING

Ten Thousand Fans Put Money On Line to Witness Exhibition—Takes Poke at One Opponent

SEATTLE, Aug. 27.—(AP) Approximately 10,000 boxing fans paid up to \$3 a seat to see Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion, fight here last night but they got only an exhibition for their money.

Dempsey toyed with three big "ham" maulers through four rounds. He held his punches back to permit Denny Lenhart, Portland, to stand up for two rounds, gave Bob Franter, Seattle negro, a few hard body punches for a round, and then let Red Ting-Jy, Seattle, go a full round after twice knocking him down. Ting-Jy took a nine-count the first time and when it appeared that he was going to stay down after the second blow, Dempsey rushed over, picked him up and let the Seattle boy punch the former champion at will the rest of the way.

Tony Bertillo, Seattle welterweight, hit too hard for Tony O'Dell, Klamath Falls, Ore., and scored a technical knockout in the fourth round of a scheduled six-rounder; Joe Ruiz, Los Angeles welterweight, drew with Don Fraser, Spokane, in six rounds.

CROTHERS WINS TRAP CROWN BY PERFECT SCORE

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Steve M. Crothers, Chestnut Hills, Pa., stood today as champion of amateur trapshooting champions.

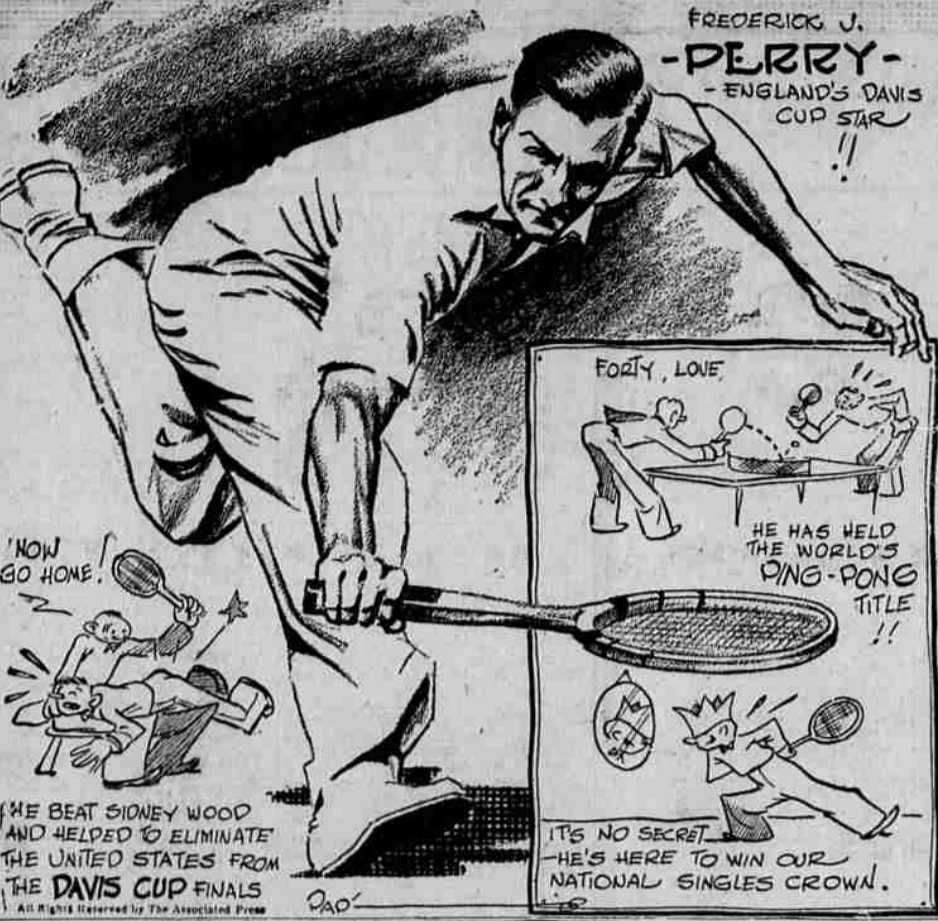
The Pennsylvania amateur finalist gave a display of perfect marksmanship yesterday to defeat champions from 41 states, the Canal Zone and Alberta, Canada, in the day's feature shoot of the 32nd annual grand American trapshooting tournament.

Crothers broke 200 consecutive targets, duplicating his feat in winning the Pennsylvania crown. He succeeds E. P. Woodward of Houston, Tex., to the title. Ted Renfro, Dell, Mont., was second, and Joe Helstand, Hillsboro, O., third.

Earl Donohue, Minneapolis professional, claimed the professional championship after winning a shoot-off from Rush Razeo of Denver.

At the annual meeting of state delegates of the Amateur Trapshooting association, the executive committee was empowered with authority to stage a trapshooting tournament on the Pacific coast some time during midwinter. The 1932 grand American will be held at the association's permanent home here.

FOOTBALL FANS WILL KEEP EYE ON NOTRE DAME

Loss of Knute Rockne Leaves Team Unknown Quantity—Three Chosen Share Coaching Burden

By George Kirksey United Press Staff Correspondent. CHICAGO.—(UP)—Without the guiding hand of Knute Rockne, Notre Dame's 1931 football team faces a strenuous task in carrying on the undefeated march of the undefeated, national championship eleven of 1929 and 1930.

assistant coach in 1925 and 1926 and line football coach, and Jack Chevigny, former halfback, named junior coach.

Notre Dame's handicaps increased when Anderson was stricken with meningitis and appendicitis during the summer, and lay dangerously ill for weeks in Mayo Brothers hospital at Rochester, Minn. Anderson's health has improved considerably but he may not be able to exert himself in football practice as he did last year.

As usual Notre Dame has a wealth of material and a hard schedule. Many of last year's stars are gone, but Rockne developed a number of understudies during 1930 who should be able to replace most of the missing men, except perhaps Frank Carideo, all-American quarterback, and Frank Savoldi, the Three Oaks, Mich., Italian who interrupted his career by matrimony.

The regulars, besides Carideo and Savoldi, who will be absent are Capt. Tom Conley, end; Marty Brill, halfback; Tom Kassis and Bert Metzger, guards, and Larry Mullins, fullback. The backfield was the hardest hit, and of last year's stars only Marjmont Schwartz, hard-running left halfback, is again available. Schwartz was one of the best halfbacks in 1930 and he is expected to lead the Notre Dame offense again this year. He can kick, run and pass and is a great defensive player.

A three-way battle between Charley Jackwhich, Kenosha, Wis.; Emmet Murphy, East Chicago, Ill., and Laurie Vejar, Hollywood, Cal., seems likely for the quarterback job. Jackwhich, a strong defensive player, is

likely to get first call, but many believe the job will eventually go to Vejar, a miniature edition of Carideo, Jackwhich was very erratic when he ran the Notre Dame team in the last period of several games last fall.

Nick Lukats, Gary, Ind., who ripped the Southern California line to pieces last year in his first varsity competition, promises to win the fullback job. Joe Sheketskaki, Shadydale, O., a strong defensive back and good blocker, is the leading candidate to fill Marty Brill's shoes at right half.

PORTLAND DRUBS SEALS TO REACH LEAGUE PINNACLE

Coleman Poles Out Pair of Homers to Aid 11-8 Victory—Oaks Bow to Mission Batting Onslaught

FIRPO HANKERS TO MEET JACK

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey's resumption of pugilistic activity has aroused the fighting fever anew in Luis Angel Firpo, who figured in the sensational heavyweight championship with Dempsey in 1923 in New York.

Firpo, now weighing 260, reports he has done some roadwork and adds he will be in condition "if Dempsey wants a return match."

The Argentine giant is uninterested in meeting any other opponent. He estimates he could reach fighting trim in six months.
