The Crown Willamette Paper company reports net income of \$894,148 for the three months ending July 31, equivalent to \$4.49 per share on the 200,000 shares of first preferred cumulative stock outstanding.

The earnings for the same period last year were \$639,553, or \$3.20 a share on the same number of outstanding first preferred shares.

FEDERAL RELIEF WILL BE NEEDED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Prediction that federal appropriations will be needed to supplant local efforts to relieve the unemployed during the coming winter was made today by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor.

A member of the national advisory committee set up by President Hoover to aid Walter S. Gifford, national relief director, in providing relief through local funds, Green said in an interview he doubted whether this effort would be adequate.

The labor leader estimated the unemployment total would reach 7,000,000 during the coming winter and said "the need for relief will be far greater this winter than last."

IOWA INVALID KILLED WHEN TORNADO HITS

CLEAR LAKE, Ia., Aug. 28.—(AP)—A check-up today on the violent storms which yesterday swept northern and eastern Iowa disclosed the death of one, injury to several, and thousands of dollars in property damage.
