## SIX LIVES LOST AS FIRES RAGE OVER 3 STATES

### Six Thousand Fight Conflagrations in Worst Week of Forest Destruction—Many Towns Saved

Salem, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—About 100,000 acres of private lands under the state forestry supervision were burned over by forest fires this season, it was reported today by the forestry department. This acreage included slashings and green timber, but does not include fires in national forests.

In the report is also included the loss of one life in fighting fires, that of Eugene Fields at Medford. Several others lost their lives in fighting fires in their national forests, it was reported.

Today saw the end of one of the worst weeks in the history of California, Idaho and Montana, as far as forest fires were concerned. Although definite information as to the number of acres covered by the flames was unavailable, the area swept by fire was known to have amounted to tens of thousands of acres.

The efforts of fire fighters in the three states had resulted in the saving of many towns and buildings, and consequently, the damage to improved lands, especially in California, was negligible. Smoke, however, and weary, the fire fighters continued through the week, almost without rest.

Five Trapped.—The body of the fifth man, missing from crews on the Waldron creek blaze west of Coquille, Mo., was recovered. The five men were caught between a backfire and the main blaze.

One death was certain in California and two other men were believed dead. Pon Tregerson, transient, was killed on the fire line near Atascadero, in San Luis Obispo county.

Close to 4000 men were fighting fires last night in Modoc, Plumas, Lassen, Butte, Shasta and Lake counties.

In Idaho, at least 500 men were on the fire lines. In Montana, some 1000 men attempted to stem the onswep of fire on two sides of the continental divide.

In both Montana and California officials claimed many of the fires were deliberately set.

## ROGUE RIVER MAN UNDER ARREST ON ALIMONY CHARGES

C. W. Kelley, who has resided upon a farm near Rogue river for some time past with his present wife, was apprehended by the sheriff's office yesterday on the charge of being a fugitive from justice, at the request of the district attorney from Humboldt county, California, his former wife—now Mrs. Evelyn Dick—alleging he had failed to support their two minor children.

Kelley's present trouble is due to the fact that for two years past, according to his own story, he has failed to pay \$0 dollars a month for the support of the two children by the former wife, in accordance with their divorce decree, being in arrears now a little over \$700.

Since that divorce was granted the former wife also remarried, and now supports her children, although Kelley claims that he has heard nothing from her since that time.

He was in the justice court here this morning, accompanied by his present wife and his father-in-law, Ernest Drake. The trio had just sold or traded their property near Rogue river, for property at Waldport, Lincoln county, and were packed up and ready to depart for their new home when Kelley was arrested as a fugitive from justice.

Geo. H. Roberts, attorney for Kelley, informed the court that he had been in communication with the district attorney of Humboldt county, and that the latter expressed himself as sure the matter between Kelley and his former wife could be ironed out amicably, and would write Mr. Roberts definitely by early next week.

Hence, under the circumstances, to avoid Kelley having to be confined in jail in the meantime, Judge Taylor set the case for trial next Wednesday, and released Kelley on \$250 cash bond, furnished by the latter's father-in-law, Mr. Drake.

## ONLY RELATIVE HERE TO BURY AGED MAN

Miss Florence Doane, niece of George Pond, 85, who died Thursday from injuries sustained when struck by an auto driven by Ralph Smith Saturday night, arrived in this city yesterday from Portland.

Miss Doane states she is the only relative of the late Mr. Pond residing in the west. He is survived by a sister and a brother in Missouri. Mr. Pond was born in Illinois March 8, 1846. He had lived in Medford for about seven years.

A report was filed with the Mail Tribune this afternoon that an auto had been wrecked, 33 out-of-state cars, on the Green Springs mountain section of the Klamath Falls-Ashland highway, by striking a deer. The deer was lying dead beside the road, and the sedan was badly smashed and overturned. The accident had not been reported to the state police or sheriff's office.

## Admiral Insolent, Says City Official

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Director of Public Safety Schofield has launched a new attack on Admiral Lucius Bostwick, commandant of the Philadelphia navy yard.

Admiral Bostwick yesterday formally requested that a seaman held in county prison on a liquor charge be turned over to the navy yard pending his trial.
