SECURITY MARKET CHEERFULLY FIRM

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Security markets ended the week with a slight upward tilt and a moderately cheerful tone today, but trading, particularly in shares, was sluggish. The better tone in railroad bonds which developed on Wednesday, was maintained, while stocks generally ranged fractionally higher, with a handful of gains of a point or more. There was a little bullish activity in some of the motion picture, copper and specialty issues. Sterling exchange on New York was a little firmer today, ruling at \$4.66 1/2, up 1/8, for cable transfers. Foreign exchanges generally were quiet, however, and there was a notable lack of important improvement in sterling against the Swiss franc and the Dutch florin. Buying of the copper shares, particularly notable in Anaconda, apparently was based on a slightly firmer tone in the market for copper metal.

FORGER TELLS OF ROLE IN MURDER

LONG BEACH, Cal., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Eddie Frank Walters, 33, arrested here on a forgery count, today confessed to complicity in the holdup of the Spokane office of the American Express company on October 30, 1929, in which an employe of the company was killed. Walters said George J. Miller, convicted in Spokane of the murder and sentenced to hang, fired the fatal shot and also shot at another employe who was tied up, saying he did not want to leave witnesses. Walters said before the holdup he and Miller had agreed there was to be no violence. Whether Walters is tried here on the forgery count or tried in Spokane on the holdup charge, he probably faces life imprisonment. He is a three time loser and under the habitual criminal act of either state his conviction would mean life imprisonment.

TARIFF OFFICIAL ILL, KILLS SELF

BAILEY ISLAND, Me., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Despondent because of ill health, Alfred Pearce Dennis, 62, a democratic member of the United States tariff commission, wandered from his summer home here today and drowned himself in the waters of Cucko bay. Members of his family found he was missing when they arose this morning. They organized a small searching party and discovered the pajama-clad body a quarter of a mile away on the wet sand where the receding tide had left it. Dr. Gilbert M. Elliott, Cumberland county medical examiner, after examining the body, pronounced it suicide by drowning.
