EUGENE GOLFERS COMING IN FORCE FOR TOURNAMENT

Klamath, Marshfield, Ashland, Grants Pass and Weed Also Send Entries Southern Oregon Test

With 60 entries for the southern Oregon championship tournament having already been made, plans are nearly completed by the tournament committee for the big golfing event of the coming week end. Local and out-of-town golfers will make their opening assault on "Old Man Par" on Friday afternoon, in the 18-hole qualifying rounds, and match play in the four flights will begin Saturday afternoon.

In the women's division, qualifying rounds will be held Friday morning, and match play will begin Saturday morning. There will be either two or three flights of women players. Many from Eugene. A message received this morning from C. W. Spears, University of Oregon football mentor, indicated that he will not be able to attend, as expected, but that seven or eight Eugene players will be on hand to contest for the many prizes and trophies offered, including Leslie Leal, Oregon State junior champion; Bob and Dick Near, and other outstanding luminaries of the Eugene County club.

A delegation of ten from Klamath Falls, several from Marshfield, Weed, Ashland and Grants Pass, will complete the out-of-town contingent. Prizes Waiting. Over 20 prizes and trophies have been gathered by the tournament committee, to be divided among the winners of the various flights. Each entrant is assured of two rounds of match play, as well as the qualifying round, and the entry list is still open to any local golfers who wish to enter. S. P. MOBILIZING FOR BIG TRAVEL IN BARGAIN DAYS

With the heaviest September rail travel in the history of this and adjoining western states anticipated during the first two weeks of the coming month, Southern Pacific company today was mobilizing all its available equipment for expeditious handling of the traffic.

Re-establishment for the first time since last May of the company's now famous cent-a-mile transportation fares, September 3, 4 and 8, has led to the prediction of extraordinary travel on all parts of Southern Pacific's system from Portland to El Paso and from San Francisco to Ogden, Salt Lake City included.

Advance hotel reservations in cities in the territory involved, at resort centers and elsewhere, and pre-sale inquiries to Southern Pacific all tend to indicate the anticipated record travel, according to A. S. Rosenbaum, district agent for the company.

A 32-day return limit from the first date of sale is being authorized in connection with the "Dollar Day" sale. This added to the fact that the sale just precedes the Labor Day weekend and, in California, the Admission Day holiday, is expected to enhance the value of the bargains to the traveling public.

Travel to the much publicized Fiesta de Los Angeles, September 4 to 19, and to the California state fair at Sacramento, September 5 to 12, is expected to be unusually great, due to the cent-a-mile round-trip fares.

The roundtrip fares will be based on three-fifths the cost of the usual one-way ticket. Tickets under the plan, will be good on all trains, coach or Pullman.
