

GEHRIG CROWDING BABE FOR HONORS IN HEAVY HITTING

Lou Now Boosts Total of Forty Homers to Lead Leagues—Also First in Scoring and Total Hits

If Lou Gehrig keeps on hitting at the present rate, it seems likely that his name will be substituted for that of the great Babe Ruth in the baseball adage "he Ruth goes, so go the Yankees."

Lou has been hitting at a terrific clip for the past few days after doing well through the whole season and his burst of home run hitting has helped the Yankees considerably in their effort to overhaul Washington. He clouted a home run in each game of a doubleheader yesterday to make a record of six homers in successive contests and give himself a comfortable margin in the race with Ruth for slugging honors with a total of 40. Not only does Gehrig lead the big leagues in home runs, but he is first in the majors in scoring, total hits and runs batted in as well.

Yankees Take Two. Gehrig received quite a bit of aid from his teammates yesterday, but his two homers were the important factors in the Yankees' double victory over the Boston Red Sox which left them only a game and one-half behind the second place Senators.

Sad Sam Jones and Joe Cronin kept the Yanks from making a bigger gain as their combined work led Washington to a 5 to 1 triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics.

The western half of the American league schedule was rained out while the single game in the National league served principally to give young Jim Mooney another chance to show what a rookie southpaw can do. Mooney turned in his fourth victory for the New York Giants and his second straight shutout triumph as he turned back the Boston Braves by a 4 to 0 count.

ASHLAND COACH EYES PROSPECT

ASHLAND, Sept. 2.—(Sp.)—Coach Jack Blue has arrived in Ashland and is starting to corral his prospective gridiron material, preparatory to starting practice September 8, with the first game of the season scheduled September 10 with Wood. Left-over lettermen include Dunn, ham, back; Head, back; Mabbott, back; Gonnell, back. On the line Green, a junior who won his letter a year ago, is the only hold-over material. Some new material for ends and tackles must be developed. From junior high there will be considerable material which looked good a year ago on the junior high team.

STEELHEAD GOING OVER RAINY FALL

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 2.—(Sp.)—Fish are progressing up the Rogue river without serious hindrance from Rainy Falls, in the lower Rogue canyon, according to a statement by officers of the state police department. A trip to the falls was made late Saturday by the wardens after Roderick Macleay, Gold Beach canyonman, complained that fish were congregating at the falls because they could not surmount them during low water conditions.

Passage up the river of an earlier run which was checked at Grants Pass and above, indicated that the run was getting past the falls, but Saturday's inspection by Warden C. M. Malcolm stationed here and District Warden Ed Walker revealed that five fish out of a dozen seen during two and a half hours, made the jump successfully.

No fish are congregating below the falls, according to Malcolm, indicating that all of the run successfully passed the obstruction.

PARIS—(UP)—It is difficult to stand on the border line between two epochs, but the house of Lucile Paray rather successfully accomplished this feat. Since talk has been so strong about the bustle, there are bustles in her collection, but bustles of bows and flowers so skilfully arranged that they will be sought after rather than shunned. Since old fashioned capes and puff sleeves and leg of muttons have caused no end of murmuring, there are all of these items and more in Lucile Paray models—but—

Sport clothes remain unscathed. They are an evolution of themselves not of some other mode. Three-piece coat suits and long coats with matching frocks are particularly the preference. A newer, softer corduroy found many ways of making itself useful and ornamental, especially in combinations of brown and white.

Sleeves Not Simple. Taupe and henna, whether by their names or not, are back on the color map for the winter, and the former combined with white and brown, and the latter with black as caracul, or breitschwanz, are lovelier than ever. Sleeves are never simple things, but always tiers and tiers, often with the appearance of being morning glories in full bloom with the petals pointing toward the shoulder with the arm slipped through and the cuff turning back at the stem in a little green fold.

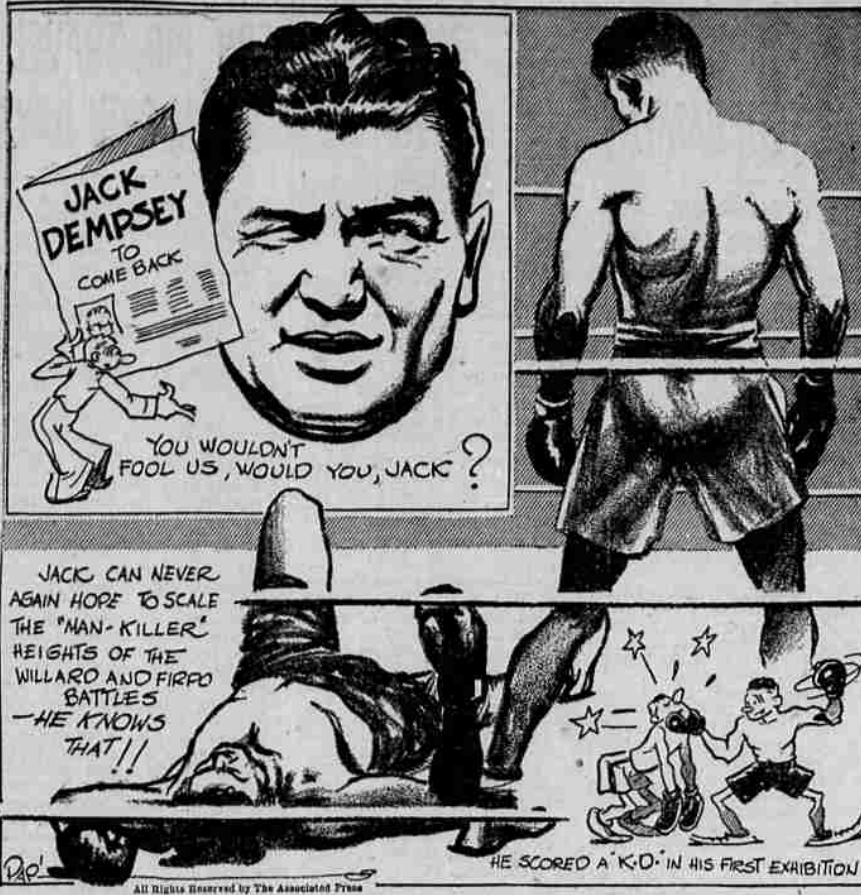
Necklaces were decidedly interesting, being made of wooden buttons with holes in the centers and wrapped in raffia or different colors and varnished. Others were of fish scales artistically put together to resemble small cardboard boxes united to an opalescent hue. They looked huge against the neck although their dimensions were only an inch square, but in reality were lighter, if anything, than a mere feather.

Frogs Back Again. Wool "frogs," not unlike the ones that used to be used on pajamas, appeared down the front of one coat-suit. With this as with many other suits prominently featuring buttons and fastenings, there were only two or three of the buttons fastened while the rest remained more or less as trimming.

Periwinkle and a purplish blue was an old combination for coat and dress, the coat being of the periwinkle trimmed with soft grey fox, and the lining and dress of the purplish blue in crepe romaine. Black silk braid, the shiny kind, was used by the yard upon yard around the skirt of two frocks and almost covering the sleeves, row upon row.

But really, the little flower bustles were adorable, and one that was made of loops and loops of stiff taffeta ribbon gathered apparently from a tunic that held the hips down tightly, suddenly unfastened and made itself into a cape with the big bow in front—proving therefore—that if a bustle is a necessary evil this winter, it also has its virtue.

Florida Clubs Add Two Golf Tournaments for Winter Season

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—Two new prize-winning golfing events are on Florida's schedule for next season. In addition to the two fixtures at Miami and one at Bellair, there will be the Gasparilla open at Tampa and a 36-hole medal play tournament at St. Petersburg. The Bellair tournament will be played February 27 and 28, with the St. Petersburg meet to follow. Dates for the \$4,000 Gasparilla open have been tentatively set for March 3 to 6. Glenn Adams, manager of the La Gorce country club at Miami, asked for March 17-19 for the open tournament there. The La Gorce tournament, largest on the Florida schedule, will be worth only \$10,000 a year instead of the custom \$15,000. "Pug" Rentner, star Northwest university fullback and forward player, has broken his right wrist 10 times. Southern association baseball club last season banded out 643 home runs. To date they have only 300 for 1931. Gilbert English, third sacker of the Durham, N. C., club has been sold to the New York Giants.

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
