SINGLE RE-ICING ENROUTE EAST IS SOUGHT ON FRUIT

The matter of one re-icing in transit of fruit shipments is now before the general committee of the perishable freight board of the railroads, and will be considered at the hearing to be held in October, the Rogue River Traffic association was advised at its meeting today. The general committee opened its sessions in Chicago yesterday, and will make recommendations, and gather data for the later meeting. The "one re-icing in transit" will be also discussed at the Northwest meeting of the railroad advisory board to be held in Spokane, September 11. Adoption of the one re-icing in transit meet would mean a substantial reduction in cost of shipments to Eastern markets. A letter was also received from William H. Horsely, secretary of the Pacific Fruit Growers' Council, that plans were proceeding favorably for the nation-wide pear advertising campaign this fall and winter, and the pear-ple campaign, would also be used, as a "tie-up" to educate consumers in the merits and the value of the pear as a food product.

CLEAN UP BLIGHT, IS AGENT'S ADVICE

Every effort should be made on the part of pear growers to clean up all cases of blight in their orchards at this time, advises L. P. Wilcox, county agent. Trees are going dormant early this season, due to the drought conditions and as the sap flow is downward, many small blight infections will become serious cankers if left too long. Bright clean-up work should take place immediately following the fruit harvest. Small cuts now may mean the saving of many large branches. Be thorough and do not spare the disinfectant solution.
