Gandhi Proposes To Lift Bans On Indian "Pariahs"

BOMBAY, India.—(AP)—Mahatma Gandhi's hold upon the millions of India is greatly strengthened by his stand for the elimination of caste distinctions.

Dedicating a Hindu temple recently, Gandhi, the son of a high caste Hindu family, pleaded for the opening of the temple to the 70,000,000 "untouchables," saying that sins committed against this caste were responsible for India's failure to obtain self-government.

He declared: "It is the memory of these sins which has led me to include the removal of untouchability as a plank in the nationalist platform. God recognizes no difference between the high caste Brahmin and the sweeper."

Noted Playwright Seeking Education

OXFORD, England.—(AP)—R. C. Sheriff, who wrote "Journey's End," will become a student in New College next fall.

He is 34, and explained that he never had money enough before to go to college.

The playwright will study history for two years, perhaps to become a schoolmaster. He intends to continue his writing.

INDIA'S NATIVES HAVE GOOD TEETH SECRET

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Decayed teeth are far less common in India than in the United States.

Plentiful sunshine, universal breast feeding of infants and careful teeth cleaning may be the reasons, says the U. S. children's bureau.

Best feeding is common for practically all babies in India, and is continued until the child is about 18 months old, the bureau reports.

If lack of vitamins is a cause of tooth decay, and the mother's milk supplies these vitamins, it is believed breast feeding may be an important factor in insuring good teeth.

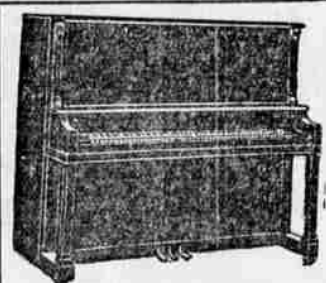
