VETERAN OUMET RULES AGAIN AS GOLFDOM'S KING

Defeats Westland, 6 and 5 in Amateur Tourney Final—Putter Has Magic—Won Title 17 Years Ago

It's "We Met"
CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—(AP) Francis Oumet has the reading public somewhat baffled when it comes to pronounce his name.
He is of French descent and because of that, almost everyone calls him "We May."
He pronounces it "We Met."
His father, now dead, was French, his mother was Irish.

BEVERLY COUNTRY CLUB, Chicago, Sept. 5.—(AP) Francis Oumet, who last year won the title 17 years ago, today recaptured the United States golf championship by defeating Jack Westland of Chicago, 6 and 5, in the final match.

His victory was by the same margin as he defeated Jerry Travers in 1914 when he was the 21-year-old "boy wonder" of golf.

Oumet got the jump on his younger rival at the outset this morning, plying a lead of four holes in the first seven and was seriously threatened only once thereafter. This was on the incoming nine of the first round, where Westland cut Oumet's lead to two up by winning the 13th.

At this stage, Oumet performed some magic with his putter, holing out on three greens from six to 25 feet and was five up at the end of the morning round.

From there on it was only a question of how far the match would go. Both played erratic golf in the hind wind but Oumet had the shot to check his rival at nearly every turn. He finished with five straight holes in par to end the match on the 31st green.

A gallery of about 2500 spectators saw Oumet scale the heights he has been seeking in vain for years. Six times prior to this year he had reached the semi-finals, once the final, only to be turned back. Today, at the age of 38, he completed a march of triumph through a tournament which had been dominated by golfing youth almost from the outset and succeeded the great Bobby Jones as king of the amateur realm.

Long Putt Helps
Oumet's experience, better judgment of his shots and frequent strokes of genius on the greens were the deciding factors. Francis was often in trouble but he always had a telling shot or two in reserve when he needed it. One of these was a long putt, 25 feet, on the 18th hole that kept Westland from what looked like a sure win. Another was a great chip at the 27th for a half, where Westland had a good chance to win and cut Oumet's lead to only four holes.

The wind played havoc with Westland's tee shots as well as his approaches, in addition to which his putter never behaved as it did when he was rolling them in from all corners, earlier in the tournament.

In his first final and only his second championship, however, he gave a game exhibition against an opponent who simply knew too much about the royal and ancient pastime for him to offset.

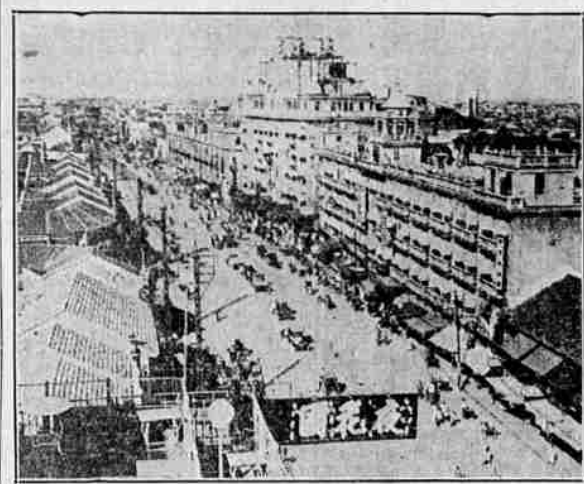
The court will not be in session September 24 to 26 inclusive, at which time the state bar association will meet at Marshfield. The court will resume next Tuesday, following the summer vacation.

KILL RUM RUNNER AND NAB FOUR IN SPEEDBOAT CHASE

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Sept. 5.—(AP)—One man was killed, four others were arrested and a 60-foot speedboat carrying 400 cases of liquor was seized early today by coast guardsmen after a chase just outside Gloucester harbor.

Joseph Mello, 39, of New Bedford, was hit in the back when several shots were fired at the fleeing run boat, the Lasschen, from the coast guard picket boat 2394, commanded by Boatswain's Mate Roy Fitzgerald.

The shots splattered the muddy flats and splashed the water about the guardsmen as they dove into the river and waded along the banks. None was injured and 250 cases of liquor were recovered.

Radio Reports Safety of Nautilus in Polar Region

OSLO, Norway, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Sir Hubert Wilkins reported by radio from his polar submarine this evening that the craft had been damaged by a dive under the ice pack, but the damage was not of serious nature.

OSLO, Norway, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Somewhere within the Arctic circle the adventurous submarine Nautilus was safe and sound today after five days of anxious silence.

Sir Hubert Wilkins' radio operator was contacted by the meteorological station at Tromsø yesterday and they "talked" for 20 minutes. The commander of the expedition reported that all aboard were well and sent greetings of assurance to his friends. The Bergen radio station and the ship Driftgryt Nansen also established communication with the submarine but none received any indication of its position. It was believed to be lying in Eckmann bay off the island of Spitzbergen.

The good news brought an end to mounting anxiety in shipping circles and caused the cancellation of plans to start by sea and by air on a relief expedition.

On leaving here August 18 Sir Hubert told his well-wishers not to worry if the Nautilus was not heard from for several days at a time because he intended not to take any risks that might endanger the craft or the lives of his men.

The Tromsø wireless station established communication with the submarine by accident. Attempting to reach another Norwegian station, the operator heard the Nautilus calling. The operator and suggested that the message be sent through him.

WORK AND HOMES ON WASTE LANDS PLAN FOR STATE

Labor Commissioner Advances Method for Solution Unemployment Problem by Improving Land

SALEM, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Purchase by the state of logged-off lands for improvement into producing property was recommended here today by Charles Gram, state labor commissioner, as one solution of the unemployment problem facing Oregon. The program announced by the commissioner as a method of action by the state, has been under consideration by the department for many months, Gram said.

The program calls for the state to float a bond issue over a long period of years, secure much of the 150,000 acres of logged-off land from the various counties, reforest that not suitable for agriculture, then sell the better lands in small lots to families, and provide for long-term payment.

Ald Back to Land Move
The program would pave the way for a back-to-the-land movement with the three-fold object of providing employment, encouraging small home ownership and replacing on tax rolls increasing volume of land now unproductive and non-taxpaying, Gram said.

Before announcing the plan for consideration by the governor, state land board and other official agencies, Gram said he had presented the program to county officials and organizations over the state and that it had found favor among thoughtful men. It is believed that the present emergency can be met with such a movement.

"The idea must be employed," Gram said. "Many must be fed, clothed and housed. Whenever and wherever there are projects that are more important they should be utilized."

Employment Reserve
"The idea of land improvement is brought forward as a reservoir of employment when other projects are not available."

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—(AP)—O. G. SHAKY COUNT SEND GOLD H TO UNITED STATES

Nearly Five Billion Accumulated—Hoover Feels Solution Rests in Return to Stabilized Basis

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—(AP)—The concentration of a vast portion of the world's gold supply in this country is considered by the Hoover administration a problem not within the purview of governmental action. Shipments from foreign countries have increased so rapidly in recent months that nearly \$5,000,000,000 has been accumulated. The administration takes the view that at least \$2,000,000,000 of the unusual surplus is not due to favorable trade balance.

The inflow was attributed by high government officials to the feeling of insecurity of nations in foreign countries about their governments. It is made known yesterday that the administration resents the charges that the surplus is the result of American hoarding.

Confidence in U. S.
With a large number of governments throughout the world more or less undergoing strained conditions and in some cases crisis, many nations have sent their gold to the United States because of confidence in American institutions.

It was made clear that the larger portion of the gold here was held by private institutions and that it came from individuals and bankers who were uneasy as to conditions in other countries.

Never before in the history of this country, officials said, had such a situation existed in the gold market. The American government feels that the solution rests in the ability of other governments and their financial institutions to return to a stabilized basis.

HOLIDAY LIQUOR NABBED ON HILL

SAMUSHIRO, Japan, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Flying a monoplane which has twice failed to span the North Pacific in a single hop, Don Moyle and C. A. Allen, California aviators, arrived here today confident they will succeed in their projected 4400-mile flight to Seattle.

The two-day uprising has cost the lives of at least 23 persons and wounded scores more.

Bandit Wounded By Portland Officers

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Albert Gould, robber suspect who Thursday night escaped from an apartment house here in a pistol fight with deputy sheriffs, today was shot in the left temple as the conclusion of an overnight hunt. He was critically injured.

Gould, former prisoner at San Quentin, today was found in tall grass on a suburban lot. He had been hiding there since his escape from the apartment house in which he was living with a man and woman.

JOYS OF SUMMER HOLIDAY TO PASS WITH LABOR DAY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Millions throughout the country today ended their week's work for their last fling at summer over labor day week-end.

From cities poured hundreds of thousands toward seashore and mountain resorts, while many from the rural sections invaded big towns to get a glimpse of the sights.

Both of these vast groups had the same idea—to get away for a short time from the discouraging prospect of a hard winter—but many others remained on their jobs to add that much more to their feeling of security during the coming month.

Labor Day on Monday, comes late this year, as late as it can. Since its adoption by the American Federation of Labor in 1884 it has been on the first Monday in September. It has become an American institution and has been declared a legal holiday by congress and state legislatures.

The day has a significant bearing on American life. Besides being reserved by union labor organizations for celebrations and for stimulation of their members' interest, the day is the turning point of much of the nation's business and social life in the early autumn.

Summer resorts receive their last great influx of city visitors and their last big receipts of the season. When Labor Day midnight comes, the spirit of these playgrounds of American curls up for the winter. Schools open.

With millions now jobless in cities and industrial regions, charity organizations will begin after Labor Day to feed and care for them until the workmen cease to be idle.

Southern Oregon's major golf classic of the year got off to a good start today on the fairways of the Rogue Valley links and in the morning rounds of the women's tournament the favorites all came through with victories. Mrs. D. H. Wood, defending champion, disposed of her opponent, Mrs. C. H. Fogle of Klamath Falls, 7 and 6, ending up with three fourths.

Anna Mae Fuson took the measure of the only other Klamath woman entered when she defeated Mrs. W. L. Quinn, 5 and 3. Mrs. Delroy Getchell won over Mrs. Tom Fuson, 4 and 3. Rosemary E. R. won by default from Mrs. J. H. Cedarwall.

Golfers in the men's flights did not begin driving off until the women's play was over and results of the opening round will be printed in the morning edition of this paper. Donald S. Clark, 1930 champion, drove off at 1:30 to defend his title against one of the best fields of golfers ever to enter a southern Oregon tournament. The fairways of the course, drier than usual, made playing a bit more uncertain and upsets are looked for in this afternoon's play.

Consistent Play.
Mrs. Wood, women's titlist, won her match this morning by playing conservative, consistent golf. Her opponent, Mrs. Fogle, found the rough open in the early holes and dropped her first three holes.
