

### GROVE SHOOTING AT MOUND MARK OF 34 VICTORIES

#### Athletics' Ace Chalks Up 27th Win of Season in Clash With Boston—Reds Take Fifth From Cubs

Robert Moses Grove of the Athletics now is plugging away at major league mark that has withstood the best efforts of American league hurlers for 19 years.

Back in 1912, Joe Wood won 34 games for the Boston Red Sox and lost only five for a winning percentage of .872. It has never been bettered. Grove rang up victory No. 27 yesterday at the expense of Boston, 2 to 0. He has lost three, giving him a percentage of .890 with some four or five games to go.

Waite Hoyt gave the champions a clean sweep for the day by beating the Sox, 6 to 1, in the second game.

Homer Wins for Tigers.

Gerald Walker, youngster recently recalled from Toronto, gave the Detroit Tigers a 4 to 3 victory over Chicago, when he hit his first major league home run with two on in the sixth inning.

The Yankees and Senators scrapped through 10 innings before Washington won out, 5 to 4.

Led by Taylor Douthit, who cracked four singles, the rebellious Cincinnati Reds made it five straight from the Chicago Cubs, 12 to 3.

The Boston Braves suffered their 12th defeat in 13 starts when the Phillies sniped them under, 11 to 1.

Only one Robin got as far as third base as Bill Walker pitched the Giants to a 3 to 0 victory over Brooklyn.

Pittsburg made it two straight over the St. Louis Cardinals, when Helme Meine bested Bill Hallahan in a fine duel, 3 to 1.

### SPEEDBOAT MARK SURE TO FALL IN WOOD-DON CLASH

DETROIT, Sept. 5.—(AP) Barring mechanical trouble, or other mishaps common to such contests, a new world record for competitive speed boat racing will be set up late today when Gar Wood and Kaye Don meet in the first heat of the seventeenth renewal of the Harmsworth trophy race.

Don, British challenger, and Wood who has held the trophy for more than a decade, have driven their hydroplanes, Miss England II and Miss America IX, respectively, at more than 100 miles an hour in straightaway trials. The gourd-shaped Harmsworth course, laid out in the Detroit river, probably will not permit a 100 mile pace, but last year's average for the Harmsworths of 77.500 miles an hour is considered certain to fall in the first 30 miles heat this afternoon.

The race is scheduled to start at 5:30 p. m. (eastern standard time).

### FISHING IN ROGUE GROWING BETTER

Of interest to Medford anglers is the following bulletin on Rogue river fishing conditions a day or two ago, by the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce:

"While fishing conditions are not at their best, there is considerable improvement over conditions of a week ago. The temperature of the water is still falling and there is a more decided movement of the fish upstream. Reports from different sections of the river show better catches being made every day. One party of four on a trip from Grants Pass to the Booth Ferry on Monday took eight steelheads, two jack salmon, two large-mouth bass, and a number of trout. These were mostly taken on spinner. On all sections fishing is improving and after a good rain fishing conditions will likely be better than usual at this season of the year.

"Salmon are spawning on the riffles in the upper river and cut-throat and large trout are plentiful below the spawning beds, but owing to the liberal supply of natural feed are taking the fly poorly."
