SCHOOLS RE-OPEN WITH 2312 READY TO RESUME WORK

Over 11 Per Cent Increase Noted in Senior and Junior High Schools — Rain Halts Grade Pupils

School days are here again. Vacation ended at an early hour this morning for members of Medford's younger generation, who went trooping off to classes 2312 strong at the sound of the first gong.

The enrollment for Junior and Senior high schools showed more than a 10 per cent increase for the first day over last year, the total being 1141. In the grade schools, however, the rain exerted an influence, dampening the spirits of many education bent pupils, who failed to appear on the opening day.

Completion of comparative figures cannot be correct for this year because of changes in board lines of the grade schools and removal of the ninth grade from the Senior to the Junior high school, Supt. E. H. Hedrick stated this morning.

Totals given for grade schools are: Jackson 269, Lincoln 221, Roosevelt 311 and Washington 370. In the Junior high school there are 638 and in the senior high school 503 pupils. The figures in grade schools for last year showed: Jackson 333, Lincoln 292, Roosevelt 298 and Washington 343.

The decrease will be more than made up tomorrow, the school authorities believe. The rain is blamed for the absence of many younger children, and the holiday weekend for the failure of others to be present for the first day.

With the opening of school this morning, two new buildings, the senior high school on South Oakdale and Dakota, and the new Washington school on Dakota and Melrose went into service. A new annex has also been added to the Roosevelt building, since the close of school last spring.

On the other hand, five hundred millions spent for construction would help business and industry, and contribute to prosperity's return.

It might be said that giving five hundred dollars to each of a million families, enabling them to buy, would also help prosperity.

Opponents of the dole say: "No, the American worker does not want charity; he wants a job."

There is a good ring to that, but what is the difference between charity and a job artificially created, for charity's sake?

When you create jobs you declare that men willing to work are entitled to a living. That to which a man is ENTITLED is not charity.

Shall the government's five hundred millions be used to provide for 100,000, or for 1,000,000 idle men and their families, thus helping the industry and prosperity's return? Or shall five billions, which would be nearer the mark, be used to maintain 1,000,000 or 10,000,000 of the unemployed and their families? Do you wish to placate the unemployed by employing a chosen few, in an international calamity?

Five BILLIONS is probably the necessary minimum for this emergency. Our government found double that amount to help Europe, engaged in the noble task of cutting throats. The prosaic task of helping our own people to fill their stomachs seems to lack the charm possessed by Hungary, Belgium, or borrowing Britons.
