

WILLIAMS' RETURN TO FACE CHARGES HERE CONSIDERED

Former Mine Promoter May Be Allowed Leave Philadelphia for Prosecution On Medford Charges

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 8.—(AP)—The court today allowed indictment against Steele D. Williams, 55, to be nolle prossed so that he could be taken to Medford, Ore., where, officials were told, charges of obtaining money under false pretenses are pending against him.

Williams was arrested here July 24 on a similar charge in connection with his efforts to sell stock to Alfonso E. Kautsch.

County officials are expected to reach a decision on the return of Williams within the next couple of days. The expense of bringing the prisoner from Philadelphia is the main point.

Efforts have been made the past month by friends and kin of Williams to adjust his local difficulties. He is alleged to have mortgaged furniture belonging to "Your Office Boy," and is charged with receiving money under false pretenses, and is further said to have civil suits pending. He has been held in the eastern city on a stock-selling deal since last July.

Williams during his stay here, established offices of the Kermit Metals, Ltd., in the Liberty building, and proposed to mine land near Gold Hill. The project never got beyond the formative stage.

At one time he engineered a plan for the erection of a seven-story building near Main and Holy streets. In a public letter, he flayed the local press for not giving his schemes support, and threatened to move the general offices of Kermit, Ltd., to Grants Pass.

VALLEY FARMERS WELCOME RAINS

HAGERTY NEW AIR MAIL MESSENGER

The mail messenger carrying service between the postoffice and the airport three miles north of the city has been awarded to F. R. Hagerty on his bid of \$540 per year, the lowest bid submitted, it was announced today.

The contract requires that air mail arriving on the four daily planes here be delivered to the post office, and the out-going air mail from the post office be delivered to these planes. The messenger must furnish his own equipment. However, in so doing the contractor does put in much time, thus enabling him to devote the major part of the day to private business.

The new messenger succeeds Frank M. Brazille, who has held the position for several years and resigned some time ago, the resignation to take place on September 10.

BAYLES AVERAGES 236 MILES HOUR IN SPEEDY PLANE

CLEVELAND, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Ten days of spectacular and record-setting achievements of the air came to an end today as the 1931 national air races were concluded.

Scores of pilots played to 270,000 persons during the races, which reached a climax yesterday as Lowell Bayles of Springfield, Mass. sped an average speed of 236 miles an hour through the approaching dusk to win the \$15,000 Charles E. Thompson trophy race.

Hurting his roaring Gee Bee super sportster over the 100-mile closed course in new race time, the speed sensation of the 1931 races left seven contestants, including Major James H. Doolittle, far behind.

The record, made by a French pilot, is 378 miles an hour.

Once during the race Bayles sent his Gee Bee sportster 288 miles an hour over a mile straightaway.

Bayles won \$7,500 for his victory yesterday. J. R. Wedell of New Orleans placed second with 227 miles an hour, and Dale Jackson, St. Louis, third, with an average speed of 211 miles an hour.

GERMANY'S GIANT RADIO RECEIVING SET NEAR READY

Finest Equipment in World Installed at Beelitz—Aerials Are Striking Feature of Great Layout

BEELITZ.—(UP) One of the finest radio receiving stations in the world is at present nearing completion at Beelitz. The plant will be equipped with all the most up-to-date devices, and will work in conjunction with the great transmitting station at Nauzen.

The main building was completed in 1929. It contains a large hall, with room for 40 receiving sets and additional apparatus. The majority of the receivers are equipped four-stage high frequency amplifiers and an intermediate frequency amplifier, which, designed as band-pass filter, shows a resonance similar to that of a receiver with ten circuits. Each receiver is fitted with 19 valves and devices for fading compensation and current limitation.

Reserve Power
An innovation has been introduced by feeding the whole receiving installation exclusively from the mains by means of rotating converters. In the event of an interruption in the three phase current from the mains, a reserve accumulator battery is automatically switched on. There is also a 30 kw. Diesel apparatus in reserve.

The huge directional aerials for reception are the most striking feature. When finished, they will consist of a number of horizontally arranged dipoles oscillating in the same phase and intensity.

Many of the aerials are in place. Others will be ready shortly for the reception of the night waves from New York, Buenos Aires, Cairo, Manila, Japan and Java. Multiple aerials used for the first time for receiving the 15.50 m. wave from New York, the 16.8 m. wave from Java and the 26.2 m. wave from Cairo.
