Cardboard Fruit Package Will Be Tested Out Here

The Rogue River Traffic Association, at its regular noon session today, heard remarks on the Booth Sure Crown cardboard for packed pears and apples, which the inventor claims eliminates many of the disadvantages now experienced. By the use of this crown, it is claimed, a heater and more compact top layer of fruit is obtained. Several packers signified their intention of using the product as an experiment, to test its worth.

David Rosenberg of the Pear Growers' council, explained progress of the plan now under way for a nationwide advertising campaign for the winner pears. Mailing of a letter to all growers, explaining the details and worth of the advertising plan, was related.

A report was received that the arrival of two or three cars of small pears from this section, some as small as 2 3/4's, at the New York market, was "giving Medford pears a bad impression."

Letters relative to the efforts of the traffic association to secure the opening of the Potomac gateway from eastern rail heads were read.

S. S. Smith Brags on County in Metropolis
