CAFE-OBSERVATION CARS FOR SHASTA

Lounge and dining cars on Southern Pacific's Shasta will be replaced by modern cafe-observation cars, effective September 10, according to information received by A. S. Rosenbaum, district freight and passenger agent.

These cars, fresh from the shops, are described by Mr. Rosenbaum as being beautiful and commodious equipment. They are a combination dining and observation car. Space is divided into a cafe with seating capacity of 15 and a luxurious lounge room with open-end observation platform.

The combination cars are being placed in service for the winter months following the close of the tourist season and consequent diminishing of traffic will make operation of the separate dining and lounge cars impractical, according to Mr. Rosenbaum.

CAFETERIA OPENS AT HIGH MONDAY

The high school cafeteria will open Monday if the entire equipment is installed by that time. Mrs. Gertrude Gates, in charge of the domestic science classes reported today. It is expected that about fifty will eat there the first day, although no check has been made to determine the exact number. An average of 70 was served during last school year.

Most of the equipment for the cafeteria is new although a portion of it has been transferred from the old high school on West Second street. The food is prepared by the practical cookery class, in which there are eight girls.

Serving and dish washing is done by several girls, who are paid for their work. Some of the students receive their meals, and others receive money.

Pass the Pear Pie

I Believe I Will, Thank You
Enthusiasm for pear pie is being generated at Medford, and the glory of a prune pancake is being extolled at Roseburg. We have no doubt that our own leading product lends itself well to freakish frills, but, ladies and gentlemen, we submit for your consideration none other than that greatest of old fashioned American dishes—mashed potatoes and brown gravy.

That, indeed, is a dish royal. The potatoes, boiled to the exact degree, beaten into a mass of fluffy, fine-textured whiteness, garnished with a generous slice of butter. The gravy, fine and smooth, with a flavor suggestive of a luscious steak or roast. Put them together and—well, please pass the potatoes and gravy—Klamath News.

The Pear Pie Inspiration
In a moment of veritable inspiration the editor of the Medford Mail Tribune conceived the idea that to popularize pear pie would be decidedly advantageous, since no finer pears are to be found anywhere than those grown in the valley of the Rogue. "This little idea," said the editor, regarding it fondly, "may be the greatest boost for the pear industry ever started—great oaks from little acorns grow." Did he not intend to say, "Great pies from little pastries"? In any case, the Mail Tribune since then has busied itself at the editing and publishing of pear-pie recipes, and of these there has been no lack, for Medford is pear-conscious, pear-minded, and pear-loyal. We will one approved formula at random:

Select ripe but firm fruit—not hard green, not dead ripe; peel, core and slice. For one pie add one cup of sugar, juice of one-quarter lemon, one-half teaspoonful of cinnamon. Bake about forty minutes.

We can think of no valid reason why a good pie cannot be fabricated for the gentle pear. After all, a pie is as good as its crust, plus an excellent fruit. And to put pears in a pie, plausibly, presently should result in the waiting of odors fondly familiar to every American household. We think, in deed, that citizens of Oregon, who have no pears trees of their own, should insist upon trying a pie manufactured in loving kindness, from Rogue river pears.

Let it be understood that I have no pecuniary interest to serve in connection with a Tillamook dairy farm as much as I might enjoy owning one. I was a teacher by trade, having been with one school for 17 years, when the idea occurred to me to be the owner of a little downtown restaurant. In this capacity I continued for two years and this is what Rogue River pears and Tillamook cheese did for me:

Now I am a candidate for a Tillamook dairy farm or a Rogue River pear orchard. A few Medford people could be called upon to attest the veracity of what I say for they were frequent visitors of the Terminal lunch.

In the breakfast menu I included stewed Rogue pears, along with peaches, figs and dried prunes. They were well patronized.

I served pear pie, as you now suggest, with a piece of Tillamook cheese. I found that this was even more popular as a seller than apple pie and Tillamook cheese.

For an appetizing winter salad I placed two halves of canned Rogue pears on a lettuce leaf, topped this with grated Tillamook cheese, a little mayonnaise and a dash of paprika, and I had a salad that would make even a fastidious Medford booster return to my place of business.

I used fresh or canned Rogue pears generously in combination fruit salad. This I topped with whipped cream and served with a slice of Tillamook cheese. You may have to use a substitute for Tillamook cream, but even then, with Tillamook cheese, you should be able to get good results.

I feel like coming to Medford in the capacity of a cook and finding out if Medford people are as good boosters for their product as Tillamook people are for theirs. If they are, in the course of two years, I might be the owner of both a Tillamook dairy farm and a Rogue River pear orchard.

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WORTMAN SEES BOURBON CHANCE COMING ELECTION

Frank Wortman of Phoenix, democratic warhorse, has returned from his annual visit to his old home in Nebraska, and reports dire distress in the middle west, and "excellent" chances for a democratic presidential victory next year.
