HIGH STUDENTS SIGNING UP FOR EARLY DEBATES

Senior high school students have started registering with Ralph R. Bailey, debate coach, in order to take part in the inter-class debates, to be conducted during October. The new public speaking auditorium will be used for the instruction. The room was built especially for the training of speakers, and is equipped with a stage.

Three members of last year's debate team, Helen Wilson, George Bennett and Max Carter, who won the championship of the state last year, are back in school, and plan to participate in the forensic activities this year.

The subject to be used for debate throughout Oregon is, "Resolved: That the state of Oregon shall have a system of compulsory social insurance." Twenty other states in the union have adopted the same question, applying it to their own localities.

As this subject is to be introduced in the United States congress next year, much interest has been shown. The plan of compulsory social insurance, known in most European countries as the dole system, has been adopted by the leading nations in the world, with the exception of the United States.

The plan the affirmative will introduce deals with the point that each laborer pay a portion of the income into a sinking fund, to be used for the care of himself and family in case of illness, or indigent old age. The money would be paid to the funds in the same manner as the state collected by the industrial accident commission.
