PITCHERS' BATTLE SLATED BETWEEN BEST AND AULT

Portland Outfit Heavy Hitters Is Report—Valencia Will Be Back in Medford Lineup for Crucial Game

The Portland All-Stars, headed by Jimmy Ault, will play the Eagle Point Cheesemakers at the fair grounds tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in the big game of the year. The clash will probably assume the elements of a pitchers' battle. The visitors beat the Colored Giants a month ago and are touted to give the southern Oregon champions a tussle worth seeing.

It was announced today that the game would be played, rain or shine, snow or cyclone.

Cliff Best, veteran left-hander, will oppose Jimmy Ault, a former Pacific Coast league pitcher in the pitcher's box. Best held the Pacific Outfitters scoreless for six innings last Monday, and Ault had the Cheesemakers guessing for the same length of time. Best is now reported in the best form of the year.

The Eagle Point line-up will be the same as last week, with Billas behind the bat, Valencia, who hurt his foot labor day on first, the Dunn brothers at second and short, and Al Droulette on third. The outfield will consist of Markel, Conlin, and Logan.

Eagle Point will have Gipe of Grants Pass, and Cook, their work horse, on the bench in case Best finds the going rough.

With Rod and Gun



Tonight at 7 o'clock the first annual sportsman's show and wild life exhibit opens in the ice coliseum in Portland. Animals, birds and fishes brought from all sections of the state through telegrams, telephone calls, motor and horseback trips are housed for the opening and all local game enthusiasts who plan to be in the metropolis during the next several days are urged to visit the wonderland which has been created.

From four bare walls and several thousand empty seats the coliseum has been turned into a wilderness, with forests of evergreen trees and woodland shrubs, mountain peaks, a river that cascades down through rocky gorges to wind through a chain of placid lakes on which wild ducks, geese and other waterfowl paddle, dive and splash, according to James H. McCool, in the Oregonian.

In cages made to appear as nearly like their native dens as possible, bobcats and cougars slink, growling, back into the shadows. Bears, coyotes, badgers, beavers, raccoons, minks, groundhops and porcupines are also included in the show. But Mr. McCool does not mention one of Oregon's best known animals, and several southern Oregonians are wondering if the skunk has been denied admission to the wild life exhibit.

Thirteen pens of upland birds are listed, and lakes inhabited by thousands of trout.

A few steelhead are coming up the river, according to reports from Savage Rapids dam. There will be an exodus of fishermen to the Rogue tomorrow, according to plans today. Just what luck they'll have with the rod, however, isn't forecast.

BIG LEAGUE CLUBS VIE FOR POSITION BEHIND LEADERS

Among the major league clubs which have no chance of getting anywhere in particular a couple of hot races still are going on.

Brooklyn and Chicago are arguing as to which shall get the third place cut in the National league money division, but the struggle between Detroit and St. Louis for the top of the American league's second division is just as close.

After exchanging places several times within a short period, Detroit and St. Louis wound up in a tie yesterday when the Tigers were badly bumped by the Boston Red Sox while the Browns had a day off. After losing four games in a row and 12 of their last 13, the Red Sox came back and shut out Detroit 5 to 0.

Brooklyn and Chicago each won a game and gained on the St. Louis Cardinals and New York Giants, the first and second place clubs, which were both defeated. Combining 14 hits off three Cincinnati pitchers with a few gift chances to score, the Robins beat the Cincinnati Reds, 8 to 3. A half game behind, the Cubs came through to down the Phillies for the second time in succession, 3 to 1.

The Pittsburgh Pirates downed the New York Giants, 3 to 2. The Boston Braves won from the champion Cardinal 3.

Chicago downed the Yanks, 3 to 1. Four American league clubs had an open day in their schedule.

BEAVERS FINALLY WIN A GAME FROM 'FRISCO MISSIONS

Los Angeles had a big time last night taking a doubleheader from Seattle 7-2 and 10-3 to increase their lead as toppers of the Pacific Coast league.

One of last night's games was played to settle the "no contest" affair between the teams at Seattle August 30 which resulted in lengthy controversy after the umpire had allegedly declared the game forfeited to Seattle because Los Angeles had "stalled."

Harry Williams, president of the Coast league, finally ordered the entire game to be replayed.

Another doubleheader was evened off between Sacramento and Hollywood, the Senators taking the first game 5-2 and the Stars the second, 7-5.

The Portland Beavers slammed Mission pitchers for 15 hits and a 12-4 victory last night. The Reds collected 10 hits but were unable to convert them into more than four runs.

Four Oakland pitchers yielded 20 hits to San Francisco last night and the Seals took an easy 16-6 win.
