There are 1500 chapters of P. E. O. in the United States, Canada and Hawaii. They include 30,000 members. P. E. O. was originally a college sorority, founded more than 60 years ago. In addition to the many activities carried on by the organization now a revolving educational loan fund of half a million dollars is maintained. As much as \$800 can be borrowed by a student from this fund.
