CHAMPIONS HELD SCORELESS THRU FIRST 5 FRAMES

Rally in Final Minutes Fails to Produce Runs When Double Play Follows Hard Smack by Young Catcher

The Portland All Stars defeated the Eagle Point Cheesemen yesterday at the fairgrounds, 9 to 4, before the largest crowd of the season.

The southern Oregon champions were outplayed and outgeneraled, and the visitors garnered hits when hits meant runs.

Eagle Point was held scoreless until the sixth inning, when Logan scored on a hit by Droulette. The champions gained three more in the seventh to complete their total for the day.

NEW RECORD FOR AIRPLANE SPEED

GABBY STREET ACE of the Cards

By Alan Gould, (Associated Press Sports Editor.) No. 1—Man of Destiny.

Thirty years ago young Charley Street was a semi-pro catcher down in Tennessee, while Connie Mack was manufacturing his first American league pennant combination.

Twenty years ago, the "gabbie" backstop in the American league, Street, handled Walter Johnson's fireballs and snugged a ball dropped from the Washington monument, while Mack ruled the baseball world.

Ten years ago these two stunts were practically all the folks remembered about Gabby. He was through with the war and, as most everyone thought, through with the major leagues.

No more than six years ago he was the manager of a class "C" club at Muskogee, Okla. You can't go much lower than that in organized baseball. Maybe Gabby Street had to hit the bottom before he could bounce back.

At any rate he began the great comeback. Less than two years ago, in the winter that Street was named manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, he sat at a banquet table and watched a skit that had for its theme: "In May, Gabby, you won't be there."

Cardinal managers had come and gone with startling rapidity. Success was no harbinger of security for them. Consequently the boys all laughed heartily. So did Gabby.

Slide then he has won two successive National league championships with a marvelous exhibition of leadership. He has already signed for 1932.

Gabby himself is a fatalist about it all, believing that "what is to be will be." He may be the National league's "man of destiny," the leader they have been looking for to break the spell of American league domination.

For the second straight year Street will match his ball players and his wife with the old master, Mack, who also first won his spurs as a catcher and, like Street, a smart one.

Mack is 20 years older than Street, 30 years older in big league managerial experience, the pilot of nine championship clubs, but he will need all the resources of his famous Athletics to turn back the club that has caught its inspiration from baseball's latest "miracle man."

The boys might not have been so ready to josh Gabby Street if they had looked up his record or remembered his catch off the Washington monument and the fact that he was Johnson's favorite battery-mate.

Street has been in strange places and seen unusual things. He went off to the Spanish-American war at the age of 15 because the streets were just naturally a fighting clan, down in Alabama.

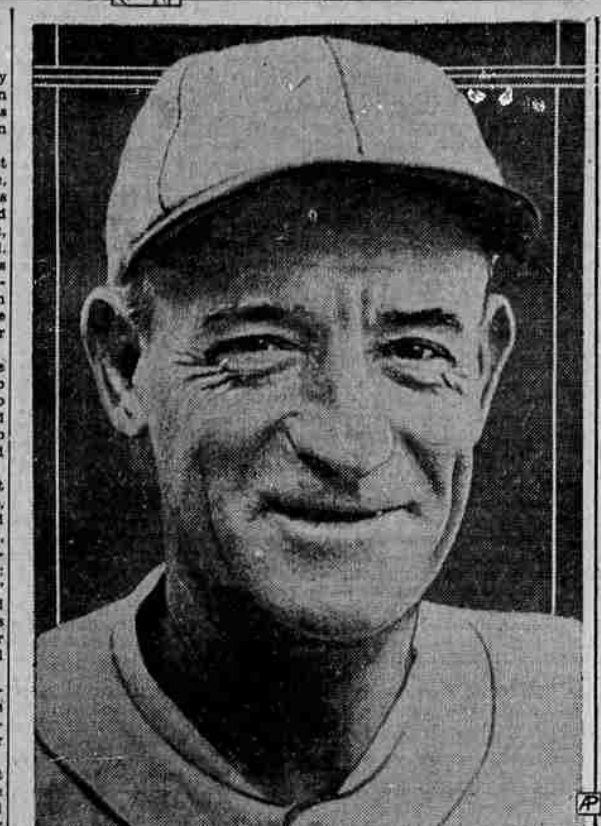
He had his first big-time trial in the National league wit' the Cincinnati Reds, but became an all-star backstop in the American league.

He battled against Rube Waddell, Chief Bender, Ed Walsh and Addie Joss. He caught for the old New York Highlanders later, while Babe Ruth was still in an orphan school.

Gabby went through the San Francisco earthquake, the Federal league war and the World war, emerging, wounded and with honors, as Sergeant Street of the Chemical Warfare service, A. E. F.

For a fellow who loves peace and quiet he has been quite a soldier of fortune.

The second day of the qualifying rounds in the national amateur golf championship at Beverly, I asked Bobby Jones on the sidelines if he didn't wish he were out there battling—it was the first one Bobby had ever seen in which he was not competing.

Bobby grinned reminiscently. "Not I," he said, "I wouldn't trade places with anybody in the field. Competitive golf is a great game, and major tournaments may be a lot of fun after they're over, especially if you've not done too badly in them. But while they're going on—well, I'm very happy to be on the outside looking in. Besides, I have never seemed able to win one of the blamed things, in Chicago."

This is a rather odd circumstance, considering the uniform success of Bobby's career in the last eight years before his retirement. Bobby played in two open championships and one amateur, and one western, in the Chicago district, and, as he said, he never managed a victory.

First Attempt In 1917, Bobby and three other Atlanta kids came up to play in the western at Midland, and being very young and callow and full of enthusiasm and ignorance, they planned out a campaign looking to a couple of them meeting in the finals.

They all qualified, sure enough, but the plan received a severe jolt in the draw, as all four were in the same bracket. This made it impossible for more than one of them to get into the finals. However, as they were all beaten in the first round, this really did not matter greatly.

The western amateur was open to most of the world that year, and Francis Ouimet, as I recall it, won the title.

In 1922, Bobby finished in a tie with John Black runner-up to Gene Sarazen in the national open at Skokie, and in 1923, after winning his first major crown, the national open at Inwood, Bobby was highly favored to win the amateur title at the big Flommoor course.

He qualified in a tie with Chick Evans for the medal, and was beaten in the second round by Max Marston in a great match in which Bobby was four strokes better than par in the morning round and Marston five better than par from the 16th hole to the end of the first round.

Bobby played no more championships in Chicago until 1928, when he tied with Johnny Farrell at Olympia Fields and lost by one stroke in a brilliant play-off, each finishing with two birdies.

Chicago Nice Once Still, Chicago was the scene of one very pretty little victory for Bobby, personally, in his astonishing performance in the one-round medal competition in 1928, for the Warren K. Wood memorial bowl—the great round in which he produced seven consecutive threes, beginning at the eighth hole, and the last nine in 30, and converted a very sour start into a record score of 87.

The same week he captained the American Walker Cup team at the Chicago Golf club in its most sweeping victory to date, the Americans winning 11 matches out of 12, and Bobby winning in singles and four-somes.

But Bobby retired from competitive golf without ever winning a major title of all his baker's dozen in one of the greatest golfing centers of America or of the world.

DARKNESS ENDS WHITE SOX TOIL ON TIED SCORES

Work 14 Frames in Sunday Clash With Boston Red Sox—Gehrig's 43rd Home Run Aids Yank Victory

By Hugh S. Fullerton, Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer.) The American league has teams that are better than the Chicago White Sox and a few that are even less successful, but there is none to dispute the Sox claim of working harder than any other team for victories.

Chicago played four games on Saturday and Sunday, struggling thru 46 innings, and the best they could get out of it was two victories. The second game of each doubleheader ended in a tie. After beating the New York Yankees in 13 innings Saturday, they played a ten inning, 13-13 tie before darkness stopped them.

The 14 innings Yesterday Chicago downed the Boston Red Sox 5 to 5 in the opener behind Red Faber's effective relief pitching. Then went 14 frames to a 2-2 draw.

After the two overtimes battles with the White Sox, the Yanks played a third extra inning game in the first half of yesterday's doubleheader going twelve frames to defeat the Detroit Tigers 2 to 1.

Tony Lazzeri made a clean steal of home for the winning run. Lou Gehrig's 43rd homer of the season made it possible for the Yanks to win the second game in nine innings, 4 to 3.

Alvin Crowder allowed Cleveland only six hits and made three himself to give Washington a 7 to 1 win. Cubs Provide Thrill Chicago's Cubs provided the big thrill of the National league program, although the St. Louis Cardinals took another long step toward clinching the pennant. The Cubs won the first game from the Boston Braves, 11 to 7, when Manager Rogers Hornsby went in as a pinch hitter in the eleventh inning and clouted a home run. Guy Bush completed the string of five straight victories that established the Cubs firmly in third place when he pitched his second one-hit game of the year to win the second clash 8 to 1.

The Cards defeated the Phillies 6 to 2 and 7 to 2. The Giants ran into a severe setback at Cincinnati when Larry Ben- ton, bested Bill Walker in a mound duel that marked the first game of a doubleheader. The Reds scored the only run of the game in the ninth inning. The Giants won the second 9 to 4.

Fred Helmsch of Brooklyn threatened the National league fielding record for pitchers as he handled ten chances in a game with Pittsburgh. The league record is eleven. He also came out with a 6 to 5 victory.

SIXES RIVER TROUT DIE IN LOW WATER

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 14.—(AP) Game deputies said today hundreds of thousands of small trout, as well as some larger ones, are dying in pools along Sixes river in Curry county where the water holes are drying up.

Mink and other animals have eaten parts of trout 10 to 14 inches long, deputies say. Thousands of trout from 3 to 5 inches long will die if not rescued, the wardens declare.

Predictions of an early winter are already invading the city, following the first reported flight south of geese. Minds of many sportsmen are turning to thoughts of duck shooting, too, in spite of the fact that the deer hunting season opens Sunday.

The change in the open season, which gives Oregon from November 15 to December 15, is welcomed here. The biggest flight of ducks settles in this region in November and December, and declaring this portion of the winter open, sportsmen believe, will actually add to the continuance of duck life. In view of good hunting, the various duck clubs will feed the birds while the food situation is bad. Otherwise they would probably neglect this work.

When the earlier season was announced for Oregon in the national campaign for conservation of ducks, the game commission of the state planned to join the Washington game commission in protest. President Hoover, however, announced the change before this became necessary.

Jackson county is one of the 15 in which there will be an open season on quail from October 15 to October 31. The bag limit is 10 birds on quail in any seven consecutive days.

DUCKS AND REDS SPLIT TWIN BILL IN SUNDAY PLAY

(By the Associated Press) A double win over the Seattle Indians ended a big week for Los Angeles yesterday as the Angels continued to top the Coast league in the closing weeks of second half play.

The tribe was routed in the first game 15-5. The second game, although a tighter affair, was claimed by Los Angeles, 4-2.

Hollywood, winner of Last year's championship and first half honors this year, saw its chances for second half honors fade as the Stars dropped a double header to Sacramento. The Senators took the first game 2-4, with a ninth inning rally, and captured a listless second game, 6-4.

The Mission Reds gave Portland a 7-3 beating in yesterday's first game, but the Ducks returned to take the second, 7-6 after grabbing three runs in the ninth inning. The Missions took the series six games to two.

San Francisco and Oakland divided the Sunday double program, the Seals taking the first game, 4-1, and Oakland the second, 3-1. The series was split, four and four.

LOADED WEAPONS BANNED IN AUTOS

Hunters planning on hiking to hills for the opening of the deer season, next Sunday, will be held to strict observance of the new state law prohibiting the carrying of a loaded weapon in an auto. The law provides for the transportation of a weapon only if it is unloaded, be it rifle, shotgun or pistol. The pistol carries no permit, if over 12 inches long.

The main objective of the law is to curb promiscuous shooting from autos, particularly during the bird season. In many parts of the state this has become quite the practice. Last fall, on the Crater Lake highway, a motorist heard rattling against his machine when the coupe got between a hunter and a Chinese pheasant in an adjoining field.

Main routes to hunting grounds will be patrolled by the state police and an augmented force, at the start of the season.

St. Paul Wins Flag For Seventh Time

ST. PAUL, Sept. 14.—(AP) The St. Paul club today held the championship of the American Association for the seventh time in the league's history.
