Man Is New, Says Ford.

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Important flying news, all good. Two plucky Germans with a Portuguese companion, flying to the United States from Lisbon, via the Azores, were reported sighted yesterday afternoon by a steamer 395 miles off the east of Halifax and were expected in New York this morning.
The triumphant fliers that you will soon hear on the radio have interesting names, Willy Rody and Christian Johansen, Germans; Fernando Costa Vieira, Portuguese. They hopped across the ocean from Juncal Do Sol. That accomplishment must delight Christopher Columbus, who doubtless has heard of it already.
A British flier, Lieut. J. N. Boothman, won the Schneider trophy, now permanently Great Britain's property. He averaged 340.08 miles an hour, over a triangular course. This beats the best previous record, also British. In a magnificent performance, another British flier, Lieutenant Stainforth, set a speed record, flying at 404 miles an hour.
A nation that can make such airplanes and find men to run them ought not to be discouraged about a few million pounds sterling one way or the other.
It is what men have in their brains and hearts, not the gold reserve, that makes a country.
This country, with its gold piled up, and France, too, for that matter, should remember that Alexander conquered rich Persia when all the money he got from his father was less than what he afterward spent on scientific research for Aristotle.
On September 13 the United States air mail will celebrate its 20th anniversary. President Hoover, his predecessor, Calvin Coolidge, the postmaster general are to be congratulated for their encouragement of the air mail, most powerful in developing and encouraging the American airplane industry.
Interesting was the marriage, in an airplane, of beautiful Almee Semple McPherson and "Pharoah" Hutton, choir leader. Mrs. McPherson took the husband up, and with heaven and future happiness above them, they were married.
Everybody wishes them well, and the husband, who has doubtless read Maeterlinck's "Life of the Bee," may congratulate himself on the happy ending of his wedding flight with Queen Almee.
When a queen bee flies up with her husband, she comes down to live happy and busy after. He comes down dead. Nature and science are kinder to human husbands, sometimes.

M'CLOUD SHIPS FIRST FREIGHT OVER NEW LINE
McCLOUD, Calif., Sept. 15.—(AP)—The first movement of freight out of California on the rails of the Great Northern railway, inaugurating a new transcontinental service, was initiated in this little northern California town today.
While mill and locomotive whistles blew and railroad and lumber company executives and employees and school children cheered 60 cars laden with pine lumber products rolled out on the tracks of the McCLOUD River railroad toward Lookout, where the train was hitched to a locomotive of the Great Northern railway.
The shipment will be hauled intact to St. Paul and distributed from there.
Completion of the Great Northern's California railroad construction and the dispatching of the \$50,000 lumber shipment marked realization of a dream of the late James J. Hill to penetrate and serve the transportation needs of California. The Great Northern's connection with San Francisco and the California coast will be completed shortly through junction with the Western Pacific railroad.

KINGSLEY LOSES LAST HOPE

DEATH VERDICT HAS APPROVAL OF HIGH COURT

Eloquent Plea for Mercy by Slayer's Counsel But No Error Shown — Will Be Resentenced to Die Soon

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP) The state supreme court, in an opinion written by Justice Brown, today refused to grant a motion for a rehearing of the case of James Kingsley, who is under death sentence for the slaying of Sam Prescott, police officer at Ashland on January 24, 1931.
The record shows that Prescott was shot and killed when he attempted to halt an automobile driven by Kingsley near the city limits of Ashland. Kingsley later was captured by a state officer, and subsequently confessed that he committed the murder. He was tried and convicted of first degree murder in the Jackson county circuit court, with the result that the verdict later was affirmed by the supreme court. Petition for rehearing subsequently was filed by attorneys for the defendant.

To Be Resentenced
Kingsley will now be resentenced and transferred from the Jackson county jail to the state penitentiary. The petition for rehearing was based on alleged errors of the court and remarks of the district attorney who prosecuted the case.
"The brief of the defendant contains an eloquent plea for mercy," the supreme court opinion denying the rehearing read. "However, counsel for the defendant failed to cite a single authority or text in support of such a plea. We are convinced that the verdict returned into the lower court by the jury was reached from an analysis and consideration of the strong proof made by the state and corroborated by the defendant."

In Defense of Law
"The jury knew from the record that Prescott was armed for the purpose of executing the law, and that he was shot by the defendant, when, in the pursuance of his duty, he undertook to place him under arrest. The records also show that the defendant was armed to the teeth with two deadly weapons for the express purpose of defying the law."
"We are not convinced that the record of the trial of this case indicates that the verdict of the jury was the result of prejudicial argument by the district attorney."
Sixteen opinions were handed down by the court today.
James E. Kingsley will be resentenced to the gallows and returned to the state prison at Salem, as speedily as courts can act. Before the sentence is pronounced, the official writ of the latest action must be received from the supreme court. At the latest, this should be received by the end of the week.
All legal records have now been exhausted by his counsel. Attorney Herbert K. Hanna, and associates, Attorneys E. E. Kelly and T. J. (Continued on page 2—Story 1.)

HURRICANE CAUSES DEATH, DAMAGE IN LOWER CALIFORNIA

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Heavy property damage and some loss of life were reported today as the result of a hurricane which swept the southern half of the Lower California peninsula Saturday and Sunday.
A brief message from Santa Rosalia said the major part of the town was wrecked when a wind of near-cyclonic velocity, battered in its wooden houses and that a number of lives were lost in a tidal wave that swept over the ruins in the gale's wake.
The population of Santa Rosalia does not exceed 2000, but there is a considerable population at El Boleo mine in the hills back of the town. Serious damage was reported at the mine, but details were lacking.
The exact number of victims at Santa Rosalia and other points in the hurricane's path is unknown here for the confusion no check had been attempted.

PORTLAND WILL JOIN IN ROSEBURG JOYFEST

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP) Portland chamber of commerce officials were busy today planning the junket to Roseburg to help that city celebrate its selection as the site of the \$2,000,000 soldiers home for the Pacific northwest.
The celebration will be held Sept. 19. A party from Portland will leave Friday night and will spend the next day in the Douglas county seat, returning Saturday night or Sunday.

Blackberries Lure Bears From Woods

WHEELER, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP)—The bears are coming out of "them thar hills." Four big brown bears were killed last week on the Carl Haberlach farm on the north fork of the Nehalem. Either scarcity of other food or the unusual brightness of this year's blackberry crop is bringing the animals close to farm houses in the valleys.

MAYOR WALKER TO EMBARK TOMORROW

LONDON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Mayor Walker of New York took public leave of Europe today at a luncheon at the American club in London, where he was guest of honor with Ambassador Charles G. Dawes and Sir William Jowitt, British attorney-general. He will embark on the Bremen at Southampton tomorrow for the homeward passage.

AIMEE'S HUBBY SUED FOR BALM

MUTINY FEARED IN BRITISH NAVY; FLEET RECALLED

Pay Cut Rouses Unrest Among Enlisted Men — Exercises Called Off — Probe Will Be Instituted

LONDON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Unrest in some sections of the navy personnel because of pay cuts recommended in the government economy program was reported in an admiralty statement today. As a consequence, the Atlantic fleet exercises have been suspended and the ships recalled to port, pending an investigation.
The admiralty statement said: "The senior officer of the Atlantic fleet has reported that promulgation of reduced rates of naval pay has led to unrest among a section of the lower ratings."
"In consequence of this he has deemed it desirable to suspend the program of exercises of the fleet and to recall the ships to harbor while investigations are made into representations of hardships occasioned by certain of the cuts in pay in order that these may be reported for the consideration of the board of admiralty."

The bulk of the Atlantic fleet at present lying off Invergordon in Cromarty Firth in northeastern Scotland.
The pay of officers and enlisted men in the British navy would be cut under Chancellor Snowden's new emergency budget, along with that of the army, the London police, London school teachers, and all civil servants from the prime minister down through the house of commons and all government offices.
Dissatisfaction of the kind indicated by today's statement is rare.

COUNTY DEPUTY GOES TO PRISON

OREGON CITY, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Sentenced to two years' imprisonment on each of six counts of forging county warrants, Marshall T. Ryan, deputy in the office of his brother, County Clerk Donald J. Ryan, was in state prison at Salem today. He was sentenced less than five hours after he confessed to the forgery. The prison sentences will run concurrently.
Indictments against Ryan were returned last yesterday. When taken before the jury Ryan confessed. The total amount of the warrants forged was \$12,000.

Teacher Returns With Officer to Troubled School

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Kuenting she is the legally hired instructor under contract with the school board, District Attorney Alta King, accompanied by Lawrence Moffitt, county school superintendent, and a deputy sheriff, escorted Miss Lettie Parks back to her desk at the District No. 17 schoolhouse today.
Yesterday parents in the district installed Mrs. Maude Frady, ousted by the district board, and Miss Parks left the building. Mrs. Frady was accused by the board of misconduct and Miss Parks hired to take her place.

Blaze Destroys New High School

MISSOULA, Mont., Sept. 15.—(AP) Fire destroyed the Missoula high school building and its newly completed addition early today, with a loss estimated by school officials at \$500,000, 90 per cent covered by insurance.
Defective wiring was thought to have been the cause. Flames began pouring from under the eaves in the northwest corner of the structure about 3 a. m. The high school was a three-story building.

Aid to Home Ownership Aim of Hoover Meeting

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—President Hoover moved today to increase the spread of home building and home ownership in the United States, calling a conference of 1000 citizens from the 48 states to meet on this subject here from December 2 to 5.
The president, announcing this project, said preparations had been in progress for over a year. He pointed out the conference would be "the first of its kind on this scale in the United States."
"It will deal with the whole question of home construction and ownership, and of home environment," he said. "It will embrace finance, design, equipment, city planning, household management, and many other aspects."
The president said a score of national associations were represented in the planning committee of the project, and that 25 committees "have been engaged for months" in preparation. Funds have been provided privately, he said, to cover the activities of the committees of the huge housing conference.
The president said: "I wish to announce that the president's conference on home building and home ownership for which preparations have been in progress for something over a year will be held in Washington Wednesday, December 2nd to Saturday, December 6th, inclusive."

RUGH MAN SLAIN FOR DEER, BELIEF COUNTY SHERIFF

Ed Foster Not Suicide or Murdered, Is View—Effort Made to 'Cover Up' Accident Official Belief

Ed Foster, prospector of the Applegate district, with headquarters in Jacksonville, killed last Friday in the hills near Rich, in the opinion of Sheriff Ralph Jennings was "accidentally shot for a deer," and instantly killed. The murder theory is held untenable by the sheriff.
It is the belief of Sheriff Jennings that Foster was shot while crawling through the brush on his hands and knees and that death was instantaneous, the bullet striking the chin and passing through the heart, and ripping through the ribs.
The sheriff holds that the fatal shot was fired, either by a member of his own party or by another hunter and that after the shooting an effort was made to "cover up." According to the authorities, several discrepancies exist in the stories told by John Caples and sons who accompanied Foster into the timber.
"Not Self Inflicted"
It would have been a physical impossibility for Foster to have inflicted the wound himself, either intentionally or accidentally, Sheriff Jennings said. "We talked to the Carters Sunday and their stories failed to live in many details."
"I place no credence whatsoever, in the theory advanced that Foster was murdered," said the sheriff. "He was divorced from his wife, and there was some domestic difficulty. A man by the name of Miller has been mentioned in this connection. He is from California and drives an Overland auto. I expect him to show up as soon as he learns he is desired for questioning. We have learned that Miller was scared to death of Foster."

REFORM SCHOOL BOY RETURNED TO DURESS

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP) Vernon Reese, 17, whose complaint last year of treatment received in the state training school for boys resulted in an investigation of that institution, was back in jail today.
He must serve a year's term for larceny following a parole violation in leaving the state. He was paroled conditionally by the governor Aug. 12, placed in the opportunity class at the Polytechnic school here, but left school and went to Seattle.

Find Missing Boy Hiding Near Home

ST. HELENS, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Allen Renard, 8 years old, missing from the home of his parents since Thursday, was found by two neighbors last yesterday. He was hiding in the woods near his home and had lived on berries and milk. More than 100 men had sought him since his disappearance.
Allen said he ran away "for fun," and each night went to the pasture in which the family cow was kept and milked her.

Rigors of Storm Fatal For Envoy

BOSTON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—The death of Oles Russel Taggart, American consul at Belize, British Honduras, at Teila, Honduras, last night from pneumonia caused by exposure during the recent hurricane at Belize, was reported by radio today to the United Fruit company here.
Taggart was a native of Clarkburg, N. J., and was 59 years old. He was a graduate of Princeton and member of the bar in the District of Columbia. He was assigned to Belize in 1927.

KLAMATH BRAKEMAN DIES BETWEEN CARS

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP)—William Reuter, 40, a Great Northern railroad brakeman, was killed today at mile post 42, south of Klamath Falls. In the first fatal operating accident on the new railroad extension to Bieber, Calif. He was coupling two empty cars at a siding and was caught between the drawing bars.

GERMAN FLIERS LONG PAST DUE IN ATLANTIC HOP

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—(AP) Dying hopes were revived today when a large plane was reported flying toward New York over Keesau, N. H., but as the hours passed aviation officials agreed that the plane could not have been the ship in which three foreign aviators left Lisbon for America.
Hope was centered in the chance the ocean fliers might have come down in some isolated region to the north.
NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—(AP) Fear for the safety of two Germans and a Portuguese who took off from Lisbon, Portugal, on a non-stop flight to New York arose today as they grayed monoplane was overdue.
Tempered with fear was the realization that the plane "Eam" might have come down at some remote place in the maritime provinces of Canada. The fliers took enough fuel, by their own estimate, to last 48 hours. That hour was up at 4:30 a. m. eastern standard time, today.

Liquor Suspect Taken By Police

Russell Uitz, married and living on Bliss street, this city, was arrested by the state police this afternoon and taken to the county jail, awaiting the filing of charges alleging transportation of liquor. Authorities say that Uitz was arrested after he had made a sale to an agent.
A case of beer and quantity moonshine was seized. Uitz's plan of operation, it is asserted, was to make deliveries of beer and liquor, but to sell none at his home.

Charge Arraigned On Fatter of Kidnapping

The examination of Sam W. Hess on the charge of child stealing, following his arraignment yesterday, was being held this afternoon in Judge Taylor's court. He is charged with stealing his minor daughter from her mother's lawful custody last Saturday. The trial began at 1:30 p. m.

WILLAMETTE GREET BIG FRESHMAN CLASS

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Freshman enrollment at Willamette university, which opens here tomorrow, will result in one of the largest beginning classes in recent years. A class of 250 will be enrolled if the applications are approved. College work opens here next Monday, when all classes will begin their year's work.

DESERTED GIRL SAYS BARITONE BETRAYED HER

\$200,000 Suit Is Filed by Myrtle H. St. Pierre As Aftermath of Evangelist's Elopement With Songster

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15.—(AP)—David L. Hutton, new husband of Almee Semple McPherson, the evangelist, was made defendant in a \$200,000 breach of promise suit filed today by a young woman, M. H. St. Pierre.
The complaint charged that on or about January 20 Hutton told her he was an unmarried man, that he was in love with her and asked her to become his wife. He promised to marry her within a short time, she said, charging that a week later he betrayed her.
In April, she said, Hutton refused to see her, call upon her or speak to her. The complaint referred to the airplane elopement of Hutton with Mrs. McPherson to Yuma, Ariz., and their marriage there Sunday.
Hutton's action, Miss St. Pierre charged, has caused her great mental anguish and that she has "become broken in health physically and nervously and will continue for a long time so to be."
Attorney James G. Sanderson said his client's full name was Myrtle H. St. Pierre, and that she was "out of the city."
"Bitchous!" said Hutton when told of the suit. "I never even heard of such a woman."
She left him.
"I used to know a girl named Joan St. Pierre, but she was a very lovely person. She helped nurse me back to health once and then walked out of my life because I hadn't convinced enough to take her out." Before the suit was filed Hutton had been quoted as saying, "I suppose there are a lot of women who will claim I knew them or what not, but that's only a lot of talk."
The evangelist and Hutton were preparing to leave for Ventura, Calif., to conduct a revival service tonight. From there they had planned to continue to Portland, Ore., for similar services.

Cat and Dog On Wrecked Liner May Save Gold

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Upon the lives of a cat and dog—the only living creatures aboard—the wrecked Panama Mail liner Colombia which went on the reefs of Santa Margarita Island last Saturday night during a storm—today depended the legality of the claim to gold bullion worth \$850,000 in the strong room of the liner.
Under Mexican law a ship is not formally abandoned until every living thing has been taken off the ship. Captain Theodore K. Oaks, skipper of the Colombia, left the cat and dog aboard to establish his company's claim to the wreckage.
Meanwhile, the salvage tug Peacock was speeding to the scene of the wreck to retrieve the bullion and other cargo.
