

RULING ON ROGUE RIGHT SOUGHT BY FISH COMMISSION

Game Commission to Hold Hearings in Southern Oregon to Determine Needs in Developing Stream

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP) Wilford Allen of Grants Pass will head a committee which will soon hold several hearings in southern Oregon cities with a view to bringing the Rogue river fishing to its highest development.

This action was agreed upon at the state game commission, meeting here yesterday afternoon after considerable time was devoted to troublesome matters involving the famous fishing stream.

Hope that at some early date a court decision could be had on the question of ownership of river beds was expressed by members of the commission, as a discussion arose over the case recently heard in southern Oregon on complaint of some miners who owned shoreline property and thus declared they held property rights over the bed of the stream. This case was settled out of court and did not become a matter of record, the miners agreeing to move if complainants paid their expenses.

Decision Needed. Chester McCarthy, attorney for the commission, said today such a decision may be had at a later date, purely as a test case, although the commission does not plan to do so until the United States supreme court has handed down a decision on the Malheur lake case. McCarthy will leave Wednesday for Gold Beach, and will stop at Rogue river points on his return.

The river bed case was discussed at considerable length by the commission yesterday from a hypothetical standpoint. Commissioner Marshall Dana said the issue is the same, whether the stream be the Rogue, the Deschutes, the McKenzie or any other "so-called non-navigable stream in the state."

He suggested a ruling be had to determine once and for all the status of the fishing streams of Oregon, explaining that the commission's plan to liberate more than 2,000,000 trout in the next 10 years depends on the decision.

To Meet Power Men. A joint meeting with representatives of power companies and mills at Oregon City was ordered by the commission after giving much thought to the question of pollution and the menace of turbines on the Willamette river. Speakers declared the state faces a loss of several million dollars in salmon fishing within a few years if pollution and turbines continued their reported death toll.

Federal and state fish experts were quoted as having said the great majority of fish liberated above the falls in the Willamette never get down stream. Most, it was declared, are shipped to death by the turbines or die from pollution.

Cowgill Testifies. R. P. Cowgill, chief engineer for the commission, told the members that not a single power plant in the state has provided screens to protect fish from the speeding turbines. As a result of this information, the commission decided no fish will be planted in streams unprotected from irrigation and power plant hazards.

The commission adopted Commissioner Vining's resolution asking that 200,000 fingerling trout be planted in Crater lake next year.

TRAVEL CONTINUES THO SEASON OVER

Although the height of the tourist season is past, travelers continue to populate the highways and Crater Lake is the destination of many. L. C. Garlock, district manager of the Oregon State Motor association, reported this morning. The number of out of state autos registered in Medford this season totals 4500 today. This is slightly lower than the total for the 1930 season. The number of registrations has increased greatly, however, Mr. Garlock pointed out, since the office was moved to the highway on South Riverside. The registrations since that date over the same period of time exceed by an important number those of last year.

GOVERNOR MEIER MUCH IMPROVED

SALEM, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Governor Julius L. Meier, III at Portland for the past three weeks, was much improved this week, and is seeing visitors. In his letter to the state labor convention here yesterday, the governor indicated he would make his first appearance since his attack of indigestion at the meeting of the state highway commission this week.

In his letter he said: "During the current week I expect to confer with the state highway commission and urge an immediate decision on the part of that body as to a short route to the sea."

It was not expected the governor would return to his office in Salem for at least 10 days.

SCIENTISTS WILL ARGUE ORIGIN OF WORLD IN LONDON

LONDON.—(AP) The greatest mixture of scientists that London ever has seen is expected for the meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science which celebrates its hundredth year here September 23 to 30.

It is the first time the meeting has been held in London.

The highlight is expected to be the discussion of the evolution of the universe.

Sir James Jeans will lead the discussion and other who will take part include Dr. Barnes, the Anglican bishop of Birmingham, Prof. A. S. Eddington, Sir Oliver Lodge, Prof. R. A. Millikan, Prof. E. A. Milne, Prof. William de Sitter and General J. C. Smuts.

Evolution Storm Breeder. Evolution, of whatever kind, has always provoked a storm at the association's meetings, starting with Darwin's famous theory in 1859.

This broke into fury in a famous debate and Samuel Weyfere, then Bishop of Oxford, demanded to know whether Huxley claimed descent from an ape "through his grandmother or his grandfather."

Huxley quickly rejoined that he "would rather be descended from an ape than a bishop."

For years this controversy stirred the meetings. Four years ago Sir Arthur Keith brought it up to date with a bang.

General Smuts is coming from South Africa to be the centenary president, and he has called it "the greatest honor the empire could confer upon me."

After the opening speeches, the meeting swings into an elaborate agenda, which includes everything scientific, from insect pests to the voice as an expression of personality.

Americans Take Part. Not many Americans are taking part in this year's meeting, but more than 20 will attend and some will deliver papers.

They include Prof. Millikan, Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborn, Dr. H. S. Person, of New York; O. G. Abbott of the Smithsonian Institution, Prof. D. W. Bronk, Philadelphia; Dr. J. McKen Cattell, Cambridge; Watson Davis, Washington, D. C.; Prof. A. E. Kennelly, Cambridge; Dr. E. H. Lindholm, Princeton; Prof. W. M. Baldwin, California; Prof. Cecil Drinker and Dr. Cecelia Payne, Cambridge; Dr. W. A. Noyes, Washington, D. C.; Dr. T. M. Rivers, New York, and Prof. C. G. Rogers, Ohio.

SOUTHERN GOLD LURING MINERS AS COST DROPS

CHARLOTTE, N. C.—(AP) Interrupted by the rush to richer fields in California in '49 and again by the civil war, gold mining is being resumed in the Appalachians.

Lower production costs as a result of deflated prices of materials and machinery promise to make abandoned mines more profitable.

In Mecklenburg county, North Carolina, shafts dug by slaves are being cleared on the Frank King farm.

Less than a mile away is the Capps Hill mine which yielded more than \$2,500,000 of gold ore in its day, more than 25 years ago. Near by also is the old Hovey mine.

Old Map Is Clue. Near Rockwood, Tenn., A. K. Johnson, a doctor, is digging a tunnel into an old cave. He claims to have come into possession by an old bearskin map by Chief Owl, an old Indian whom he befriended.

Digging has been resumed in the Coker creek district in Monroe county, Tennessee.

In the Dahlonega field, Georgia, one operation alone has resulted in sale of more than \$40,000 of gold to jewelers in the past five years.

Dr. Henry Mac Payne, consulting engineer to the American Mining congress, offers figures showing that from the earliest period up to 1930 gold valued at \$51,000,000 was mined in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Alabama and Tennessee.

Spaniards Came First. Interest in Appalachian gold is first recorded by Spanish explorers of the early sixteenth century.

The first gold nugget found in North Carolina was found in 1799 near Concord and weighed 20 pounds.

Since then gold has been mined in approximately 400 localities in the state.

For many years before the civil war "Bechtler dollars" were common currency in North Carolina. The Bechtler brothers operated their private mine and coined their dollars in competition with the government.
