The low-headed Nebraskan, who fought them as they came as a lightweight, welter and middleweight, stopped Dynamite Jackson, Santa Monica, Calif., negro last night, and then out-gamed him to a ten round decision. A packed house of 10,250 the first in many a moon, paid \$17,000 to see the gory battle. The Lincoln, Neb., wildcat consistently stepped inside the negro's guard to fall away to the body and head. Ace tired toward the end, but managed to absorb the Santa Monica's so-called dynamite rights to gain the nod.
