

RE-SENTENCE FOR KINGSLEY SOON IS PROSECUTORS AIM

A request that James E. Kingsley, confessed and convicted slayer of Sam G. Prescott, Ashland policeman, be re-sentenced as soon as possible will be filed by the district attorney's office. The official papers on the supreme court's denial of a petition for a rehearing are expected to be received tomorrow or Friday at the latest. Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, holding court in Josephine county, will complete current business there today and will return to this city tomorrow.

It is possible that Kingsley will be in "condemned row" at the state prison before the end of the week. The sheriff's office has announced the intention of taking him to Salem on the first train after re-sentencing.

The last legal recourse of the defense was exhausted when the rehearing plea was denied.

Turns to Religion

According to the jail mates of Kingsley, he spends the greater portion of his time reading the Bible and praying. Often the other prisoners group around his cell, and he reads from the scriptures to them, and leads them in prayer. Since his incarceration last June, he has been deeply religious. A church organization that holds jail meetings, has interested him in religion and an Ashland woman, a member of the creed, is a visitor.

Kingsley was unaffected by the latest reversal of his legal hopes. He received the news by the "grapevine route." When Sheriff Jennings visited the jail yesterday afternoon to apprise him of the high court's action, Kingsley said:

"Thanks, sheriff, I already knew it."

He inquired when he would be re-sentenced, and when he would be taken to Salem. He said, "I want to go upstairs, and up there as soon as convenient."

Kingsley, who first met Captain Brown of the state police when in the death cell, made a whispered request of that officer.

A Plan to Aid Jobless

To the Editor:

Here is a problem, that may be worked out to help the unemployed. It will no doubt prepare a way that will finally overcome the destruction of valuable timber for forest fires. Also these forest fires usually lead up to the destruction of crops and homes.

The plan I am submitting is this: That the government and state cooperate on the formation of the plan, to put in force at the earliest possible moment. The time is just right now to begin, namely to have forest supervisors either by contract or day work, let the unemployed in the forests to cut down and buck up all dead timber, also cut all diseased timber, and get a fire started and burn up all dead brush, dead grass, in short, clean everything up in the forests. With this dead rubbish will also go the grasshoppers, timber beetles, wood ants, and rattlesnakes. This work should be carried on during the fall, winter, and spring months, when there is a low fire hazard. After this the forest will all green up making great fields for grazing, which will soon reimburse the first cost. All springs should also be opened up and covered with stones, kept ready for man and beast. Thousands and thousands of dollars have been spent protecting timber, and now that the money is gone, much of the timber is ruined, too. My plan is a sure winner. With a green forest and green grass, fine water—a pleasure to all men.

EXPAND ATHLETIC TENT REVIVALIST PLANS FOR GIRLS URGES CHRISTIANS AT MEDFORD HIGH TO SET EXAMPLE

Reorganization of girls' athletics in the senior high school is being planned by Miss Carol M. Degermark, physical education supervisor, and the system will be installed in the local school this year.

Chief in the new plan will be the awarding of athletic letters to girls. These will be given to those winning a certain number of points during the year. As a girl plays on a team she amasses points and by the end of the year may have scored enough for the letter.

All girls' sports in the senior high will be organized on the intramural basis and an effort made to get as many girls as possible interested in athletics. Two sides will be chosen from among all girls in school and the side whose team wins the most championships will be given a dinner by the losers. Tractors have been busy the past day or two grading an athletic field behind the new building.

This fall the girls' athletes will play speedball, and pitch horseshoes. In the winter season they will have basketball, volleyball, and softball. Spring sports will include baseball, tennis, track, and horsehoes.

Girls will be grouped in physical education classes according to scores made in physical ability tests, which will be given next week. In accordance with state law physical examinations will be given by the school doctors, starting next Monday. Five local doctors will be in charge of the work. The city or county health unit have no connection with this work, it is pointed out by Miss Degermark.

Senior high girls take physical education two years and may take it a third year if they so desire. Third year students may pick any sport to follow and will be able to take the one they like after being given a liberal sample of all girls' sports during their first two years.
