

POULTRY BRINGING EXCELLENT PRICES PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 16.—(AP)—Continued strength in the butter trade both locally and through the United States generally may be attributed to the decreasing output in general. Locally the make is still showing a loss although a trifle less pronounced than a few days ago. Demand for storage butter is aggravated by the shortage in the fresh make. Market for eggs continues to reflect a strong tone generally with practically no change in the local price list. Values elsewhere are generally inclined to bid intact. Demand for turkeys is unusually good with arrivals inadequate to take care of needs. Sales of best dressed hens are being made up to 30c. Some late arrivals of broiler turkeys have been made at 28¢ to 30¢ because the quality was not very good. Excellent demand is showing for broiler chickens in the local live fowl trade with commission handlers reporting business in heavy white stuff up to 20c lb. Hen market in general is stationary. Well held prices are being reported in the market for country killed hogs, veal and lamb along the wholesale way. There has been a liberal pickup of business in hogs.

COURT DEMANDS REMOVAL HEAVY BARRIER ON ROAD

The county court this morning at its regular session instructed William Perry, road supervisor, to take action to remove bars from a road in the south end of the county, erected by a woodcutter. A woman homesteader, age 70 years, and weighting according to Supervisor Perry "about 90 pounds" reported that the bars were too heavy for her to lift, and replace, and that she had trouble therefore driving home the cows, and getting places. The bars are on county land. The application of the Ashland mine operators, for repairs to the road leading to the mine was given favorable consideration, with the proviso that the costs be not over \$50. The mine company agrees to furnish shovellers of gravel for the bad spots, if the county will furnish a truck to haul it. The frame work for the quartz mill is now up, and will be in operation soon the county court was informed. It was claimed that the work would be hampered unless the road was fixed. J. E. Bell appeared before the court for the seventh time to talk over the extension of Court street from the end of North Central avenue to the Pacific Highway. The matter is still hanging fire.
