CHAMPIONS EAGER FOR NEW CHANCE AGAINST INVADERS

Batting Punch May Be Added—Big Crowd Expected to Witness Second Clash at Fairgrounds

The Eagle Point Cheesemakers, champions of southern Oregon, will take another whirl at the Portland All-Stars next Sunday, the winner to pocket the gate receipts. The All Stars defeated the Cheesemakers last Sunday, 9 to 4, and the Eagle Point squad hankers for a chance to prove this was just a fluke.

The Eagle Point team is dickering for a couple of stars to strengthen up their hitting and their fielding and provide the necessary batting punch. It is expected that an agreement will be reached with them today.

Last Sunday Eagle Point hit Jimmy Ault, leader of the All-Stars, hard enough, but their mightiest blows were stopped by the nimble All-Star fielders. Best whiffed 11 of the visitors, but they cracked him when the hits meant runs.

CARDINALS SHOOT FOR NEW RECORD IN SEASON WINS

Redbirds Hope to Eclipse Giants' Record of 101 Victories Chalked Up in 1913—Nine More to Play

The St. Louis Cardinals were in possession of their second straight National league pennant today, having clinched the flag yesterday without the necessity of firing a shot. Their only remaining goal before they tackle the Philadelphia Athletics in the world series October 1 is to be the first National league club since 1913 to win more than 100 games.

They have bright prospects of bettering the mark of 101 victories set by the New York Giants 18 years ago. Yesterday's 4 to 3 triumph over Philadelphia was No. 96, and they have nine more games to play before the curtain falls. They are likely to go on winning their share, as Manager Gabby Street announced he intended to use his best pitchers in their regular turn right up to the last day.

Reds Aid Cards.
Thanks to the Cincinnati Reds, the Cards did not even have to win yesterday to sew up their fourth title in six years. The Reds attended to that nicely when they trimmed the New York Giants, 7 to 3, in the first game of a double-header. Their 4 to 3 victory in the nightcap merely added insult to injury. The first loss made it impossible for the McGrawmen to finish closer than a half-game to the top.

Red Lucas, sometimes referred to as Cincinnati's pitching staff, had the privilege of sinking the Giants and, incidentally, scoring his 13th triumph of the year for a last-place club. He allowed 10 hits, but kept them spaced while his mates fell on Carl Hubbell with gusto.

Cubs Take Firm Hold.
The Chicago Cubs took a firmer hold on third place by beating the Boston Braves in two close ones, 5 to 3 and 8 to 7, and Brooklyn practically sewed up fourth by downing the Pittsburgh Pirates, 11 to 5.

By way of celebrating their clinching the American league flag the previous day, the Athletics rang up their 100th victory of the year at Cleveland's expense, 7 to 5. Big George Barnshaw went the route to record his 20th triumph.

Alvin Crowder scored his eighth straight win as the Washington Senators took a 5 to 3 decision from the St. Louis Browns.

By winning their third straight game from Chicago, the Boston Red Sox bounced out of the American league cellar and left it to the White Sox. Ed Durham beat Vic Prasier in a great mound duel, 2 to 1.

HIGH HOPES FOR HUSKY FOOTBALL TEAM OF POWER

Phelan Surveys Wealth of Talent in Opening Practice—260-Pound Tackle to Be Groomed as Kicker

SEATTLE, Sept. 17.—(AP) A 260-pound tackle and a flashy end from the freshman ranks, a well-seasoned center, and a couple dozen first string reserves are being counted upon to provide enough additional power to put the University of Washington in the Pacific Coast conference football race this fall.

A great abundance of backfield men, an army of big linemen and a long string of ends were welcomed by Coach Jimmy Phelan on the opening day of practice last Tuesday and they sent the hopes of smiling Washingtonians higher than the "Toy" mentions wants to see. And among this array of talent were 19 lettermen who are supposed to understand the fundamentals of the famous Notre Dame system installed last year by Phelan.

Giant to Do Kicking.
Ted Isaacson, former Seattle high school player, is the man being figured on to fill the shoes of Al Holmes, 1930 tackle and captain. And how the boy will fill them with his 260 pounds of beef. Although he is believed to be the heaviest gragger in the conference he is being groomed to do the place-kicking for the Huskies.

Phelan lost two first string wingmen in Squires and Westerholter through graduation but he has Lenfesty back for regular duty and is picking young Nesbit to fill the other berth.

The center hole caused by the graduation of Wentworth was Jimmy's biggest problem until Collin Howard, Wentworth's understudy last year, showed up in great style in spring practice. Howard is out for his third year but has seen little action to date.

Three Backfielders Set.
Three places in the backfield are set. Marsh will be shifted to quarter, Hufford will handle one halfback position and Buse the fullback job. Other veterans are battling for the other halfback berth with Wolcott and Bledsoe having the best chances. To top off the whole situation, Phelan has a dozen big linemen from the middle west looking for work. The gridders followed the former Purdue coach out to the coast and went to St. Martin's college, a junior institution, last year, making them eligible for completion at Washington this season.

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GABBY STREET

ACE of the Cards

No. 4—At the Top.

Within two years after joining the Washington "Nationals," for whom he at once became the first string backstop, Gabby Street was recognized as one of the finest catchers in the game.

Although not a powerful hitter, he was known, as Connie Mack had been before him, as a tough man in a pinch. Definitely he was more conspicuous. He handled the pitchers cleverly, outsmarted the base runners and kept up a steady line of encouraging chatter.

His chief rival for backstopping honors in the American league was Billy Sullivan, then nearing the close of his career with the Chicago White Sox.

George Gibson of the Pittsburgh Pirates, Jimmy Archer and Johnny Kling of the Chicago Cubs were the best in the National league. Bill Carrigan of the Red Sox, Ira Thomas of the Athletics, Roger Bresnahan of the Cardinals were others of prominence.

"The hands of Catcher Street of the Washington club are not marked by scars or by any twisted or broken fingers," wrote a contemporary scribe "yet he has caught more than 400 games since he joined the Washington American league club."

"Street says he always holds his fingers together when he catches the ball and that he never was injured, even when he made that record of catching 16 straight games in nine days."

That was early in 1911. Whether jinxed by this ballyhoo or not, Street shortly afterward met with his first injury, a broken finger. The accident put him out of the game for several weeks and proved

costly to the Washington club, at a time when it was also handicapped by infield weakness and the illness of the great Walter Johnson.

For the three previous years Street had averaged 116 games behind the bat, but he caught only 72 in 1911 and batted 222. This was Gabby's high mark with the stick for his first four major league seasons, at that.

His top figure for backstopping was in 1909, when he was behind the bat in 137 out of Washington's 156 contests, setting an American league record for chances accepted, 924, that still stands on the books. "Street would have raised this total," wrote an observer, "but for quitting the Nationals, laying off or becoming lost or something or other in midseason. He was gone a week or so. Otherwise he would have given a closer race to George Gibson of the Pirates, who caught 150 of Pittsburgh's 154 games."

Gibson's mark, a National league record, still stands. Ray Schalk set the American league record at 151 in 1920.

Cy Perkins of the Athletics caught 148 games in 1920 and 1922, and Muddy Ruel of the Washington Senators was in 149 games in 1924. Mickey Cochrane's high mark with the Athletics was 135 games in 1929.

Street was traded in 1912 to the New York Highlanders, who let him go to Providence later the same season.

50 TO 1 SHOT SURPRISES BY FIRST WIN IN 2 YEARS

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—(AP) "Old Butch" Covington, Kentucky horse trainer of y's and y's, sub, was rubbing his hands in glee today over the performance of his three year old pride and joy, Miss Carolina, which yesterday surprisingly won a race at Lincoln Fields, paying \$319.70 for each \$2 Mutuel ticket to win, big-gate price ever paid on a horse in Chicago.

Miss Carolina surprised "Old Butch" himself because the daughter of Hourless-War Tidings had never before won a race or even come close.

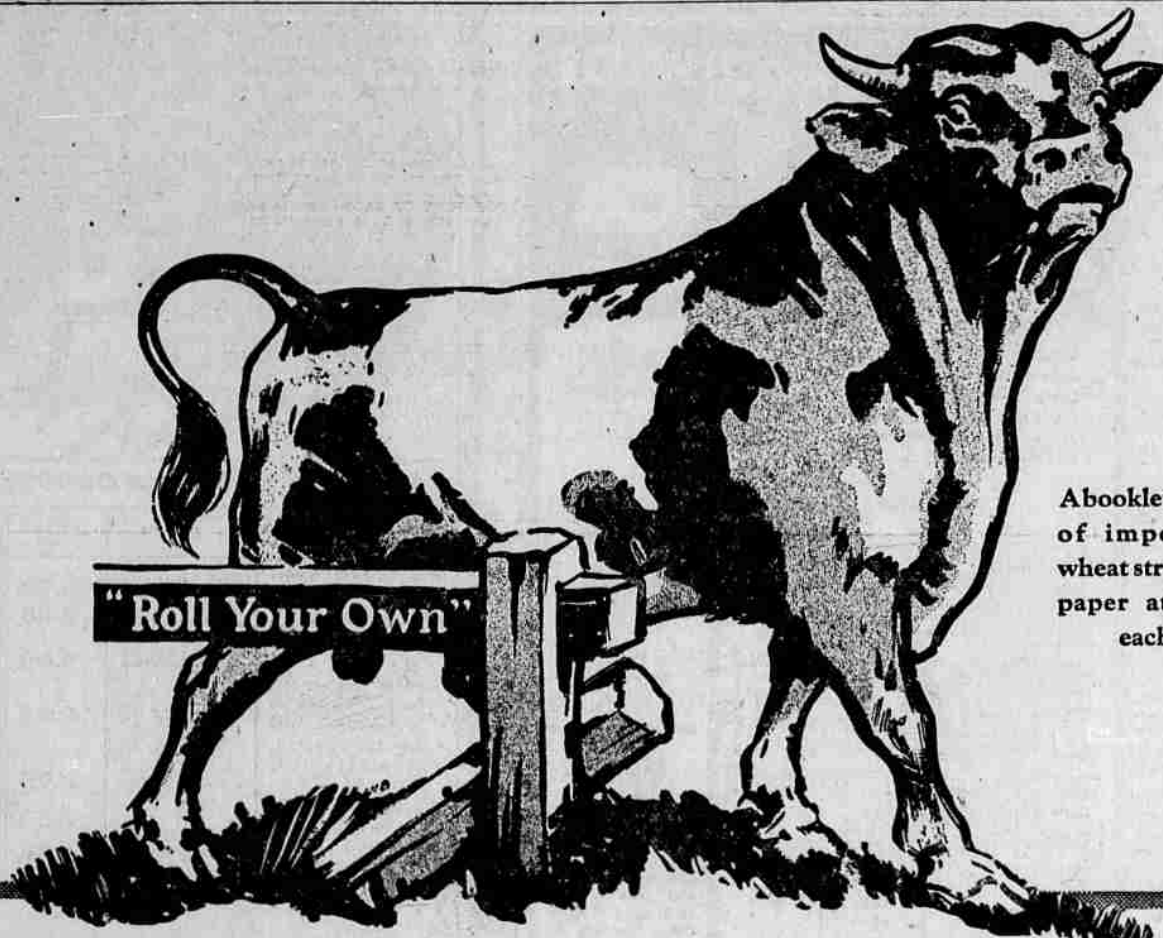
