

P-T. A. COUNCIL JOINS PEAR SHOW WITH LUNCH PLAN

All women of southern Oregon are urged by the Parent Teacher council of this city to enter displays in the pear foods show to be held in connection with the 4th club and educational fair at the Jackson county fair grounds tomorrow and Saturday.

"The Parent Teacher council urges every woman in the county to cooperate in the pear products campaign, which is being carried on by the business men and orchardists in the valley," is the message issued by the council yesterday.

"Pear growing is the major industry in southern Oregon and the prosperity of each individual depends upon the success of this undertaking. We urge every woman to bake and enter foods in the display, also to enter other products. Attractive prizes are being offered to stimulate a greater interest," the message concludes.

The council will maintain a light lunch booth at the fair grounds during the two days of the county-wide event and will include in the menu some of the new pear products.

Mrs. W. H. McGowan is general chairman of the pear foods show. She will be assisted Friday morning by Mrs. H. F. W. Spilner, chairman of decorations, and Mrs. Leland Mantzer, who will also act as hostess.

Women of the local granges will be hostesses Saturday morning, and Mesdames P. G. Bunch, H. T. Hubbard, Lawrence Pennington, Goodwin Humphreys Saturday evening.

Several commercial manufacturers of pear products are preparing displays for the show. They are not entering the competition for prizes but will be given prominent display space at the exhibit and their participation is welcomed by the women's clubs promoting the event.

Arrangements are being made, today, for increasing the number of ushers and the placing of extra chairs in the tent. It is expected that the "Family Night" program, tomorrow night, will overflow the tent. A good deal of enthusiasm is being shown by way of getting the larger families or the community together, that night, especially since Mr. Shannon announced that a prize will be given for the largest family group—father, mother and children, present on that occasion. CLEMENCY PLEA LAST EFFORT TO SAVE KINGSLEY

Action towards filing a plea for clemency for James E. Kingsley with Gov. Julius L. Meier will probably be taken shortly after his re-sentencing to hang, scheduled to take place as soon as the mandate is received from the supreme court. The decision on the denial of the re-hearing was received this morning. It is expected that the mandate will arrive today or tomorrow.

The filing of a plea for clemency is not a legal action. Attorney Herbert K. Hanna said this morning that he expected such a step to be taken, "as no man ever stood in the shadow of the gallows without someone to intercede for him." Judge E. E. Kelly, associate counsel, said yesterday, "Such action should be taken."

A plea for clemency is the last hope of Kingsley. Circuit Judge H. D. Norton is expected to return from Grants Pass today, where he has been holding court, when a motion for immediate re-sentencing of Kingsley will be acted by the district attorney's office.

Kingsley, in his cell, still finds solace in prayer and reading Holy Writ.

'3-TIME LOSERS' AGREE TO LEAVE AND AVOID JAIL

Jack Rock and Rufus Roberts, "three-time losers" as persistent violators of the prohibition laws in Jackson county, were given long jail terms in justice court late yesterday, and the sentences suspended upon condition that they leave the state, and take their families with them. Rock was sentenced to a year in jail, and Roberts to six months. Both were arrested Tuesday night, and liquor was found in their possession.

Another arrest and conviction in this state, and they would be subject to the habitual criminal law.

Rock's wife recently served a short term for liquor violation, and his son, Archie Rock, is now in the county jail, for alcohol running. He led the state police a merry chase, two weeks ago, before they caught him, dumping alcohol out of his auto. The son was first to greet the father when the jail doors opened yesterday.

Roberts is the father of five children, and the authorities state, that while he served jail terms, the family received aid from the county. He announced his intention of returning to a farm in Idaho.

Resolution No. 327.
A resolution declaring the intention of the Council to cause the alley in Block 22, Original Town of Medford, from Sixth Street to the North line of Lots 3 and 13, to be paved at a width of 20 feet; and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property; providing for a meeting of the Council to consider protest against said construction and providing for the serving of the owners of adjacent property with notice hereof by the Recorder.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon:
Section 1. That it is the intention of the Council to cause the alley in Block 22, Original Town of Medford, from Sixth Street to the North line of Lots 3 and 13, to be improved by paving the same at a width of 20 feet, in accordance with the specifications therefor now on file in the office of the City Superintendent, at the City Hall, Medford, Oregon, to which specifications reference is hereby made for details and costs thereof, and to assess upon each lot or part thereof adjacent to and benefited by said improvement, its proportionate share of the cost of said improvement.

Section 2. The Council will meet in the Council Chamber at the City Hall on the 6th day of October, 1931, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., at which time and place the owners of said adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said Council and show cause, if any, why said paving should not be constructed and why said property should not be assessed for the construction thereof.

Section 3. The City Recorder is hereby directed to serve notice hereof upon the property owners aforesaid by publishing this Resolution once in a daily newspaper, printed, published and of general circulation in said City at least Ten (10) days before the date of said meeting and by posting five copies of this Resolution in five public and conspicuous places in said City for a period of Ten days prior to said meeting. Passed by the City Council and signed by me in open session in authentication of its passage this 15th day of September, 1931.
