

COURTHOUSE PLAN READY OCTOBER 1 AVERS ARCHITECT

Next Step Will Be Advertising of Bids for \$265,000 Construction—Local Labor to Be Specified

Plans for the new \$265,000 Jackson county courthouse will be completed by October 1, according to J. G. Link, architect, who has a force of five men now engaged in the work.

With the completion of the plans and all details connected therewith the next step will be advertising for bids and awarding of the contract. In this latter action the county court will probably be assisted by the recently named advisory committee, composed of citizens of this city and Ashland.

A score of Oregon and county contractors have taken out qualification blanks, which under the Oregon law they must fill out and submit, before bidding on public work. The law also requires that the successful contractor provide ample bond for the completion of the contract.

The specifications now in the hands of the contractors, contain a clause providing that Jackson county labor and products be given preference, all things being equal.

A system is now being evolved whereby there will be no confusion, and labor applicants will be required to fill out a blank setting forth their financial status, dependents, age, experience, and other details.

The first work will be the excavating. It is planned to start the work so it will provide jobs during the late fall and winter.

employment. Relief funds from the federal government should be dispensed under the direction of local authorities who can supervise such distribution most efficiently and most effectively.

Call on Governor. "That we call upon the governor of Oregon to take such steps as may be necessary to raise a sufficient amount to match, dollar for dollar, all appropriations that may be made by the federal government for the relief of Oregon citizens. And if the federal government shall fail to provide relief, we ask that the state use its credit to the extent of \$50,000,000."

"We call upon municipalities and other local units of government to issue bonds to an extent sufficient to meet the needs of relief work. The city of Portland should authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$10,000,000. Other cities should vote bonds proportionate to their wealth."

"The problem of redeeming the bonds of the federal government, the state and municipalities can be solved later but, as we have already said, the method adopted should be one which leaves the cost on the basis of ability to pay," the recommendation stated.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—(AP)—The stock market closed with a substantial upturn today for the first time this month.

The market broke to new lows in a heavy flurry of selling at the start, but thereafter bearish efforts met stern resistance, and active purchases to retire short contracts gave the list a substantial boost in the last hour.

The list eased a little from the best in the last few minutes, but the closing tone was firm. Sales were well over 2,000,000 shares.

PART YEAR LICENSE IN EFFECT SEPT. 25

GRAIN RELIEF TOO LONG DELAYED, IS FARMERS CHARGE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—(AP)—A charge that the farm board would wait indefinitely for a perfect solution of the wheat surplus problem while the wheat farmer perishes, was made today by a group of Pacific Northwest grain men.

The group, headed by Representative Summers, republican, Washington, yesterday notified the board of their proposed "Walla Walla" plan for disposal of surplus wheat and the reduction of acreage next year.

"The board will wait indefinitely for the perfect plan while the wheat farmer perishes under surplus production," the group said in a statement before departing for home. "We have made an honest, determined effort to put in operation a plan to cut surplus production which the board has always said must be done if wheat prices are to permanently advance. The board has rejected the plan. We have asked for a modified plan but the board offers no concrete plan to accomplish the thing they say must be done."
