JACKSON SPRINGS FEUD FLARES ON SHOOTING OF COW

A cow being shot and killed accidentally for a deer fanned a neighborhood row in the rural district a half mile or more south of Jackson Hot springs this side of Ashland, and resulted in a number of cases on various charges being brought before Justice of the Peace Taylor in Medford yesterday.

In connection with this Walter Holmes, a farmer, pleaded not guilty to a charge of assault and battery and of hunting deer out of season, and his trial was set for Sept. 22.

Frank O. Hill, son of neighbor pleaded guilty to selling a calf without being legally tagged, to an Ashland butcher, J. G. Buell, and was fined \$25 and costs. Buell pleaded guilty to buying the untagged calf, and was fined \$25.

It all started the other day thru a cow owned by Walter Holmes being shot by some one for a deer. Holmes claimed that Hill's son did the shooting and demanded payment of \$40 for the cow, but Hill countered by claiming that Holmes himself shot the cow. As the result of the ensuing ristic encounter Hill swore out a warrant for Holmes' arrest on an assault and battery charge.

Then later followed the allegation that Hill had sold an untagged calf to Buell, the Ashland butcher, and both Hill and Buell were arrested.

The game warden department in an effort to find who hunted out of season and killed the cow, called Holmes' arrest on the game violation charge.
