ALL ARE INVITED TO CRESCENT CITY COMMUNITY PICNIC

Word has been received from Crescent City by officials of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association that the board of supervisors, in session today, have ordered an election in Del Norte county, for November 10, when the electors will vote on the proposed harbor district and elect the three harbor commissioners.

Assembly bill 1181, passed by the California state legislature this year, opened the way for Del Norte county to form a harbor district in order to give assurance to the federal government that terminal facilities, docks, warehouses, etc., would be provided in the event that the government completed the harbor already begun at the California port.

News of the forthcoming election is very gratifying to those who have been closely following the Crescent City harbor situation, according to C. E. Gates, development association president, and the action of the board of supervisors will be of considerable help to the delegation which will shortly appear before the board of engineers for rivers and harbors to present additional information and data with which to convince the government of the urgency of the Crescent City project.

Crescent City chamber of commerce announces that a community picnic will take place at the Smith River ranch of Thos. E. Peacock, former chairman of the board of supervisors of Del Norte, on Sunday, September 20, which will be in the form of a

celebration over the fact that the board of supervisors has taken definite steps to make the harbor district assured, thereby helping the development of the harbor. A cordial invitation is extended to all southern Oregonians to attend the picnic.

Cleric For Taking Excess Fortunes

CINCINNATI, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Archbishop John T. McNicholas of the Catholic diocese of Cincinnati today issued a pastoral letter on unemployment, in which he advocated a conscription of excess wealth as "wholly in harmony with the principles of Christian social justice."

He termed extreme concentration of wealth "one of the crimes of the country," and held that the state cannot place upon charity the full burden of caring for the unemployed.
