

BUTTER DEMAND HOLDING MARKET ON FIRM LEVEL

PORTLAND, Ore. Sept. 18.—(AP)—Continued demand for fresh butter has not only strengthened the demand and price for the local territory generally but has resulted in almost general advances being offered on the open market. Previous session of the produce exchange failed to follow the general trend of the market but those that wanted supplies—and these were among the members of the exchange—were compelled to go into the open market and pay a premium.

Butterfat prices are firm all along the line. General trade conditions in the market for eggs continue more or less strong in practically all sections of the country. There was no change in local values for the day.

In the live chicken market all prices are being well held at the recent extreme mark. Demand is best for light and medium hens as well as broilers while the call for heavy hens is fairly well taken care of.

First carload of Delicious apples apples of the season were reported. The initial supply came out of the Monroe district. Priced \$2.25 for extra fancy, \$2 for fancy and \$1.25 for C grade, well shaped and colored.

Practically no changes were shown in prices or conditions in the market for county killed meats during the day. Veal of quality is firm with hogs firm and lambs strong at full prices.

Potatoes are inclined to drag with prices unchanged. Peach demand holds well with prices stationary. Most Hales offering. Prices of sheep pelts is again lower. Cabbage market is again easier and lower.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Stock prices crumbled under heavy selling today, principal issues losing \$2 to more than \$5 net in a turnover of approximately 5,000,000 shares. The lowest prices appeared at the close. It was one of the sharpest breaks since early June.

Although weak during the morning and early afternoon, the market turned dull in the afternoon when prices steadied momentarily, only to break severely at the finish. One of the late features was a 20,000 share sale of General Motors at \$30, off \$2.12. Rails were particularly weak.

Selling of stocks was accompanied by sharp declines in foreign bonds, particularly German, and also by weakness of Canadian and British exchange. The Canadian dollar was quoted at the lowest in 2 years, or at a discount of about a cent and a half.

DODGER STUFFING IN MAIL BOXES WILL BE CURBED

Medford Firms Will Be Assessed 1 1/2 Cents for Each Pamphlet Found, Is Postmaster's Warning

A federal law has been in existence for years past prohibiting the placing of loose advertising circulars or hand bills in rural or city postoffice boxes in front of or at homes without postage, but violations have been so great in various parts of the nation that the postoffice department at Washington has cautioned all local postmasters to see that this law is strictly enforced.

Postmaster Warner received his notice of that kind today. It is understood that two Medford business concerns have been violating this law for some time past, by distributing in the mail boxes throughout the rural sections loose circulars.

Under the orders from the postmaster general just received for local postmasters to see that in enforcing this law, it is stipulated that the rural or city carrier, on finding such circular in mail boxes along his route, shall report back to the postoffice with them and collect postage from the offending firm at the rate of 1 1/2 cents for each circular, the latter being third-class mail matter.

In case a firm should refuse to pay postage to the carrier the matter will then be referred to the postoffice department at Washington for further method of procedure against the firm.
