

CANNON OPPOSED TO ROOSEVELT AS BOURBON NOMINEE

New York Governor Proven Wet, Charge of Churchman — Would Support G.O.P. if Roosevelt Named

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. — (AP) — Bishop James Cannon, Jr. of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, home from Europe, intends to oppose Governor Roosevelt for president. "Roosevelt has proven he is a wet," said the bishop. "I absolutely will not support him if he is nominated. I would say as much as I could against him. I would do all I can to help defeat any wet. I am rather a good Democrat, but if a wet runs, and Hoover runs, I will support Hoover, unless he changes his prohibition stand." Bishop Cannon is now under investigation by a senate committee on the disposal of campaign funds which he collected in the 1928 campaign against Alfred E. Smith. He denied diverting anti-Smith funds and added: "If Senator Nye thinks I am going to neglect my church work to attend his meetings, which are illegal, he is mistaken. If he wants to see me I'll see him, but if there's to be an investigation, let it be before a grand jury."

NORMAL LEADER'S FAULTS REVIEWED IN BOARD HEARING

Majority Testify in Support of President Landers of Monmouth Normal School — Fund Deficit Shown

SALEM, Sept. 18.—(AP)—The state board of education's investigation of the administration of President J. S. Landers of the Monmouth Normal school will resume here today following taking of testimony in the case yesterday afternoon. The hearing is being conducted by the special normal committee of the board, which is composed of Mrs. Walter M. Pierce, chairman; C. L. Starr and Albert Burch. A score of witnesses were heard during the opening day of the public hearing on complaints made by Governor Julius L. Meier and others concerning the condition at the normal under the administration of Landers, who has just completed his eighth year at the institution. While a few witnesses were heard substantiating complaints, the majority called yesterday testified in support of the normal and Landers. More To Come. Complaints involving improper sex teaching by Landers and expensive and extravagant administration of normal funds will be taken up by the committee during today. Written complaints played an important part in the presentation of testimony for and against Landers. Raising of grades and loaning credits to assist in graduation, overruling of committee recommendations by the president resulting in a low morale for the school, and permitting students convicted of law violations to continue classes and graduate, were contained in the evidence assembled. Miss Bertha Brainerd, registrar of the school, testifying on the question of whether or not grade records of students in her office had been altered, said that the standards of the school allowed graduation and certificate only when 96 class hours had been passed with an average grade of three. Grades Changed. She said occasionally faculty members changed grades after awarding them when students, at President Landers' request, had been allowed to do extra work. In no instance did Miss Brainerd recall that the president had overruled a faculty member when the latter had refused to permit a student to do extra work. Considerable time was spent on the complaint of financial inefficiency in the conduct of the school. It was brought out in the records that a deficiency of \$28,000 existed at the close of the last biennium.
