MAIL DELIVERED AFTER DISASTER
All the air mail consigned to Medford, so far as can be ascertained by the local postoffice, that was among the thousands of letters on the ill-fated air mail plane which crashed into San Francisco bay last Wednesday, arrived in this city yesterday, one batch in the morning and the other in the afternoon, and was delivered, after being postmarked: "Delayed due to interruption of air mail service in Oakland."
The letters were badly water soaked and somewhat soiled otherwise, but bore no traces of fire damage or smoke, and the persons they were addressed to were able to read them. A considerable portion of the mail that was in the burning plane, was destroyed or partially destroyed by fire, according to news dispatches, but the mail for Medford fortunately escaped such damage.
