EPISCOPAL CHURCH CANON ON DIVORCE HELD TOO STRICT

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 19.—(AP)—The controversial report of the joint commission on marriage and divorce of the Protestant Episcopal church was introduced in both the house of bishops and the house of deputies of the general convention today.

"Your commission is agreed," the report recited, "that in some way the church must take a more sympathetic attitude toward divorced people. The majority offers an amendment to the canon, which would allow the remarriage of divorced people but under definite conditions, namely, that a divorced person must wait a year before remarriage, and then receive the permission of a court."
