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REGIONAL MEET FOR RED CROSS HERE SEPT. 28

National Officers To Attend — Unemployment Aid Chief Topic—All County Directors Urged To Attend Gathering.

Monday, September 28, has been announced as date for the Fifteenth Regional conference of the Red Cross, which will be held in this city.

Present day unemployment problems and the transient will be the major topics for discussion. The sessions will be held in the Presbyterian church, with J. C. Thompson, chairman of the Medford chapter, presiding. Dr. William De Kleins, medical assistant to the vice-chairman, will be a guest from the national headquarters and speaker at the joint luncheon to be held at noon with the local Kiwanis club at the Hotel Medford. He has chosen as his topic, "Medical Activities of the Red Cross in Drouth Relief."

A most interesting and helpful program is being arranged for the full day and all representatives throughout the district are urged to be present. In addition to talks on the part of national representatives, addresses will be given by chapter delegates on roll call and the adaptation of the Red Cross program to local community needs. The conference will close with an entertaining demonstration on first aid and life-saving. Ample opportunity will be presented to the delegates to participate in the discussion of chapter problems.

Miss Alida J. Bigelow, field representative of the American Red Cross, will be speaker on the morning program. She will present the significant developments of the Red Cross in this territory. Miss Mary Austin of the Lane county chapter will show how the Red Cross program is adapted to our community needs and Miss Elizabeth McKinley, field director from Bremerton, Wash., will lead a discussion of the new responsibility of chapters for recreation and production work in veterans' hospitals.

Other speakers on the program will be A. L. Schaffer, manager of the Pacific branch, Ralph Carlson, first aid and life-saving representative, and Mr. Thompson, chairman of the local chapter. The address of welcome will be given by Mayor E. M. Wilson at the opening of the afternoon session. 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KINGSLEY DUE FOR RE-SENTENCING TO GALLOWES MONDAY

James E. Kingsley, awaiting re-sentencing to hang, for the slaying last January of Sam G. Prescott, Ashland policeman, while awaiting detention for questioning about the ownership of the auto he was driving, will probably be brought before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton tomorrow to hear again the words that will send him to the gallows.

A telephone message from Arthur S. Benson, clerk of the supreme court, to the district attorney's office, stated that the mandate had been placed in the mail Friday night. It did not arrive Saturday morning, and probably arrived yesterday too late for delivery. Kingsley, in the "Pauley cell" of the county jail, manifests only passing interest in the forthcoming proceedings. He spends practically all his waking hours reading the Bible and praying. He has become deeply religious. Sheriff Ralph Jennings plans to take Kingsley to Salem on the first train north after the passing of sentence.

PUBLIC WARNED OF PHONE SWINDLER

R. B. Hammond, manager of the Home Telephone company, as well as other local managers of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company throughout the state in their respective districts, issues a warning to the hotels and lodging houses of Medford and vicinity, as well as to general business, to be on the lookout for an alleged swindler who represents himself as an employee of the home company or local branch of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

The man, who it is claimed uses the aliases of Hogan, Williams, McLaughlin, Sloan, Nichols, or whatever other name comes to mind handy, is described as 40 to 45 years of age, five feet five inches in height, weighing about 140 pounds, and has an artificial eye or is slightly cross-eyed.

PRINTERS SEEK FIVE-DAY WEEK TO AID JOBLESS

BOSTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—The International Typographical union has accepted a committee report recommending that efforts be made to obtain a five-day week through peaceful negotiations with employers. The vote for acceptance was 150 to 100, after two hours' discussion by delegates to the 76th annual convention. The committee reported that a restriction of the work week was the only solution to the present unemployment problem. It also recommended that this restriction should not be ordered in a manner to close down any establishment, but should be made effective through a stagger plan which would keep down overhead and allow the expenses to be based on a 48-hour unit instead of a 40-hour one. The committee recommended: That local unions restrict the working time of members. That the general executive council confer with other printing trade unions on the question of how all could act together for the change. That the executive council confer with the employers' associations for a general discussion of the question.

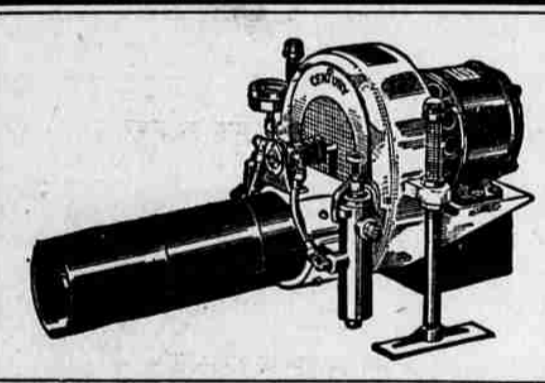
