

VANDALS EXPECT TO BE A FACTOR ON COAST GRIDS

Idahoans Tired of Being Doormat for Other Teams—Best Material of Years Available, Says Coach

MOSCOW, Idaho, Sept. 22.—(AP)—The University of Idaho is tired of being a doormat for the other nine football teams in the Pacific coast conference and it is figuring on climbing to new heights this fall. If only a notch out of the basement. Leo Galland, Vandal coach, doesn't expect to win the championship nor does he promise to finish in the first division. "But everything looks like our old stand at the bottom will be occupied by somebody else this year," he said. "I have the best material of any year since I came to Idaho in 1929. And you can take that to mean what you want."

Veteran Lineup Looms
The return of a dozen lettermen of last year, including six experienced quarterbacks, together with enough experienced material to assure a veteran team caused Galland to look hopefully on the near future.

A deceptive attack, more brilliant than in the past, is being installed to offset lack of weight. A slight change in offensive tactics has been made, the backfield having a man in motion on certain formations.

For the backfield, Galland has considerable material. Fred Wilkie and Lee Tyrrell, both plunging lettermen, head the list for fullback, and Mel Sackett and John Norby, sophomores, are set to handle the halves. Six promising quarterback aspirants are on hand, including George Wilson and Emmett Davis, making that position well fortified.

Strong Forward Wall
Six candidates for guard, at least that many for tackle and plenty of central material make the prospects for the forward wall the brightest in several seasons.

A halfback from last season, Howard Berg, and Phil Taylor, letterman, are leading the race for the end posts.

No. 8—The Long, Long Trail
The career of Sergeant Street would sound like a fairy story if he didn't have the record books and the evidence to prove how he has wandered up and down the baseball scale.

He spent all but six of his first 30 years in baseball in the bushes, up to the time the St. Louis Cardinals gave him a job as coach in 1929 and then elevated him to the manager's job. He has been with 16 different clubs in 11 assorted leagues.

After nearly five years with Washington, then short turns with the New York Highlanders and Providence club, Street made himself at home in the Southern association, with Chattanooga, and then Nashville until he decided to go to war again.

Returning from France, he buckled down to the serious business of managing minor league clubs, wherever he could find a job open in Class B or C company.

As a background for two successive National League triumphs, Street's record shows he captured only one minor league pennant. This was with Joplin, Mo., in the Western association, a Class C circuit, in 1929.

It required a playoff with Enid, winner of one-half of the split season, to decide the issue in Joplin's favor.

Styles in steers have changed, the Kentucky Marketing Exchange Bulletin says, and the steer that weighed 1,800 pounds last year cannot allow his avoirdupois to exceed 1,500 pounds if he is to amount to anything in bovine society.

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BOSTON'S RED SOX AMERICAN LEAGUE SURPRISE PACKAGE

Collins' Crew Destined to Finish in Fifth Place by Drive From Eighth—Sox Hurlers in Great Form

The Boston Red Sox and their new manager, Shano Collins, fast are proving themselves the surprise package of the American league. It looks like they will finish in fifth place, which is exactly three places higher than their most optimistic supporters would have predicted a month ago.

If they do, Collins may regard his first season in the majors as a howling success. He took over a team that consisted of a high-class pitching staff and one very fine outfielder, Earl Webb, and in the closing month of the campaign he has a club that is playing some of the best ball in either league. A fortnight ago the Red Sox began giving their pitchers some runs, and the result has been little short of astounding.

In vaulting from eighth place to fifth, the Sox have won 11 of their last 13 games. A double victory over St. Louis yesterday, 2 to 0 and 9 to 2, gave them five in a row, their longest winning streak of the year. Bill Durham, a frail right-hander, pitched his third victory and second shutout in 10 days as he let the Browns down with three hits in the first, Ed Morris allowed only four blows in the nightcap and won when his mates jumped on Sam Gray for all their runs in the sixth and seventh innings.

To give an idea of the kind of pitching the Sox have been getting, Durham has allowed only one run in his last three games, including one 13-inning struggle, while Danny MacFayden has yielded but three runs in as many contests.

Yanks and Solons in Tie.
The New York Yankees fell back into a tie with Washington for second place in the American when they dropped a 5 to 1 decision to Cleveland while the Senators were trimming the Chicago White Sox, 5 to 3.

Tapering off in preparation for the world series, the Athletics divided with Detroit, winning one game, 3 to 2, and losing another, 6 to 5.

Tony Kauffman, St. Louis Cardinal relief pitcher, supplied the high light in the day's National league program when he held Brooklyn afield for four and one-half innings while the league champions came from behind to win in 10 innings, 11 to 10.

The Cincinnati Reds took their third straight from the floundering Boston Braves, 3 to 2.

The Phillies packed away at four Pittsburgh pitchers to take their series opener, 6 to 4.

Rogers Hornsby's pitching staff received a fine drubbing as the New York Giants made 27 hits, good for a 15 to 7 win over the Cubs.

SEALS TIGHTEN HOLD ON FIRST PLACE IN RACE

CAVEMEN DEFEAT MEDFORD TENNIS LUMINARIES, 4-3

Medford Tennis club lost four matches to three in a series played in Grants Pass Sunday, with the Grants Pass Tennis club. The two cities are now tied for the southern Oregon championship, each having defeated Ashland twice, and broken even in two matches played between themselves.

Two matches were played between Klamath Falls and Grants Pass, with each team chalking up a victory. Klamath Falls did not play either Medford or Ashland during the season, which eliminates possibilities of their taking southern Oregon honors.

Of the four men's singles matches played, Jimmie Edmiston, southern Oregon singles champion, and L. Alvin Tollefson, former University of Oregon star, took three of the victories. Edmiston lost to Lewis DeGennault, taking the first set, 6-3, and forfeiting the last two, 4-6, 4-6.

What Grants Pass claims to be the best doubles team in this district—Wayne Ryan and Lyle Sama, took Tollefson and Edmiston from the top with 9-7, 6-2. Harry Garfield and Boggs were unable to hold back DeGennault and Karl Bennett, who won 2-6, 6-4, 9-7.

Although Dorothy Mitchell of this city had defeated Maxine Bennett in a match on the local court, she was defeated by the Grants Pass representative, 5-7, 6-6, 7-5.

Just after Francis Ouimet had won his second National amateur championship, after a span of 17 years to the day, I talked a bit with the great Bostonian at the Beverly Country club.

"Of course I'm awfully happy," said Francis, and his strong, homely face was beaming.

"It's a wonderful thing to me, to feel that after all these years I've been lucky enough to win another major championship. But there's another thing which I believe makes me even more happy."

"You know—or perhaps you never have thought—that it's not just the easiest thing in this world for us old fellows to come out, year after year, and plug around and try to qualify, and sometimes fall even to do that, and then, getting in the tournament, play our match or two or three, and be turned back by some powerful young chap; perhaps a boy in his first big tournament."

For the Old Boys
"I never mentioned this before, O. B., and I'd never said a word about it now, only I've been lucky enough to win—an old fellow. And what makes me happiest about this victory is feeling that I've struck a blow, and won a tournament, for the old fellows of golf, who have seen their best days, just as I have; and yet who return to the battle year after year, and do their best."

Francis Ouimet was not smiling.

Sixteen Long Years
Then came 16 years, in which he was often semi-finalist and runner-up, but never a winner. He played Bobby Jones four times, in the semi-final round, pitting the great Georgia boy the first time, at Engineers' club in 1920, and losing to him at Merion and Baltusrol and Minikahada.

He was medalist at St. Louis in 1921. He was rated always a great and formidable contender, but he never won—until this second September 5.

By the same score it went. Francis stopped Jerry Travers, on the 13th green of the second round at Ekwanok, 6-5, and he shook hands with Jack Westland of Chicago on the 13th green of the second round, 6-5.

If you figure the world's series prospects in terms of how often Grove and Earnshaw can pitch for the Athletics, with adequate rest, the delay in the start of the baseball classic is not calculated to make things look any better for the Cardinals.

As I have it from a source close to the situation, the inside story is that the St. Louis baseball office, not the forces on the field, dictated the delay by which the series does not start until Thursday, October 1, although it could easily be opened on Tuesday, September 29, or certainly no later than September 30.

Over the objection of other National league men, Sam Breadon, the Cardinal president and his executive staff, insisted the St. Louis ticket situation could not be handled satisfactorily in time to permit an earlier start.

It seems the Cardinals have a coupon system of dispensing season ticket books carrying "preferred" world's series privileges.

Apparently this is so complicated it takes at least one extra day to make sure none of the regular customers are overlooked.

Soft for Connie.
Whether they considered the angle

or not, however, the Cardinal "front office" played directly into the hands of Connie Mack, who is highly ambitious to set a record of three straight world's championships.

Under the present schedule he can pitch Grove and Earnshaw in games No. 1 and 2 at St. Louis, October 1 and 2, and then come right back with the same pair at Shibe Park October 5 and 6, in games No. 3 and 4.

The clubs travel eastward Saturday and can't play in Philadelphia Sunday. Thus, each of the Athletics' aces would have about four days of rest, if Mack chose to rotate them.

This is more rest than they usually need and the chances of the A's making it four in a row would be enhanced, depending upon the returns for the first two games.

Confidence Not Enough.
The Cardinals, with Jesse Haines in the box, squeezed out a victory over the great Grove last year. Gabby Street's men have all the confidence in the world they can repeat, but it takes base hits as well as optimism to do anything against the lanky pitcher.

The Red Birds have yet to take the measure of Earnshaw. For some-
