TWO ARE GRANTED FULL CITIZENSHIP AT HEARING HERE

Naturalization examinations were held this morning by W. Blackman, federal examiner, in the circuit court room, at the conclusion of which, exercises were conducted by Col. W. H. Palmer of the American Legion, and Circuit Court Judge H. D. Norton made a short address.

Final examinations were held for R. C. Mulholland and Edith Carolina Schrammek of this city, and they were granted citizenship papers.

Preliminary hearings were held for Oscar Johnson, his wife Marion, James Douglas, and Henry E. Schmitt, all of Grants Pass. Schmitt was instructed to study more about American laws and customs, and to appear for examination next February.

Final examinations for the other three applicants will be held at Grants Pass tomorrow.

Questions asked the applicants dealt with history, geography, and the constitution, and each was asked if he had any religious scruples against war, or was a member of the I. W. W., or an anarchist or a communist.
