

BUTTER AND EGGS HOLD STATIONARY; TURKS IN DEMAND

PORTLAND, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Continued steadiness was reflected in the market for eggs here with practically no change in the selling price either by the Co-Ops or by private firms. Receipts continue to reflect a fractional gain and especially so in the pullet class. Demand is good for all offerings with a daily cleanup of arrivals. Receipts of eggs in Portland this year to date show a very substantial decrease as compared with this same period a year ago.

While there has recently been a slight increase in local make of butter, demands appear fully able to take care of all supplies in sight. Butterfat values are almost stationary. Demand for turkeys is most favorable here with prices ruling from 28c for old toms to 35c lb. for young toms of the new crop. Arrivals are limited with practically no storage stocks in sight here.

Prices are unchanged in the market for chickens so far as buying values are concerned.

Generally drifting tone is reflected in the market for onions. Market for country killed calves showed a rather favorable tone during the day and especially for lights of quality. Hogs are fairly active at steady price. Lambs continue firm.

There is a real scarcity of quality tomatoes in the local market. This is creating firmer to higher prices for such supplies. Low grade stock is plentiful and still quoted very low.

Portland Co-Ops to Advance Egg Price

Prices churned violently on the New York stock exchange today, as Wall Street strove to get its bearings amid the confusing events of this history-making week.

Turning strong in the final hour, the market more than cancelled earlier losses of \$1 to \$2, apparently basing the rally on reports that the exchange authorities intend to discipline professional bears who insisted on raiding tactics. Although restrictions on short sales have been lifted, the exchange always frowned on "bear raids" made solely for the purpose of breaking quotations and it was said that four prominent traders had been called on the carpet this morning and told such tactics must cease.

Broker Drops Dead.
In the excitement, one broker dropped dead of a heart attack while at work on the exchange floor.

New regulations, effective tomorrow, "direct that members report all short sales covered by purchases on the same day, including odd lots in each stock, for each account, whether of a member or of a customer, giving the name of the owner of the account."

Prices reacted from the top of the afternoon rally as the pace of trading subsided, but the closing tone was strong.
