## MRS. COLLINGS IN OPEN RECITAL OF PIRATES' ATTACK

HUNTINGTON, N. Y., Sept. 25—(AP)—Mrs. Benjamin P. Collings, in her first public recital today of how two men boarded the Penguin and murdered her husband in Long Island Sound September 9, indicated that she deliberately permitted them to abduct her believing that, by so doing, she might save her husband and child.

As the assailants placed her in a canoe, she told Coroner William B. Gibson at the inquest, that she saw a boat approaching the Collings' drifting cruiser, so she went with them quietly—hoping that, with their attention concentrated on her, her husband and her daughter might be rescued.

Her testimony also revealed for the first time publicly that five-year old Barbara Collings was awake during the struggle on the Penguin and saw the slayers tie her father's hands before they crashed a milk bottle down on his head and threw him into the water.

"Leave my papa alone," she said Barbara called out to them.

Mrs. Collings appeared to be under a severe strain as she told her story.

## HOWARD SCHOOL BUDGET REVISED

State Tax Commissioner Bruce Galloway met yesterday afternoon with the county board of equalization, School Superintendent Susanne Homes Carter, relative to the Howard school budget for the coming year, which petitioners claimed exceeded the six per cent limitations law, and doubled the 1930 budget.

By agreement of all concerned \$3000 was clipped from the new budget, \$5000 for building and improvement, and \$1000 for maintenance.

Commissioner Galloway took the budget to Salem for revision, with the balance of the state tax commission and it will be returned in a week or ten days.

Dr. J. M. Keene, Michael Hanley, William Olsen, Allen Adams and Gene Sellar represented the petitioners.

Club program outlines cover an two-hour period from 3 to 4 o'clock. The 20-minute radio lecture is timed for 3 p. m.

It was definitely decided that aid from the welfare workers could only be given to residents of Jackson county. All those who are able will be required to work for the food and clothing they obtain.

Hamilton Patton was named chairman of the committee to gather the produce and clothing. He is to be assisted by Ensign J. R. Park of the Salvation Army and Oscar E. Hoover. This committee will cooperate with the Red Cross and the Salvation Army, according to President Porter.
