

### MAYOR APPOINTS CITY COMMITTEE ON BICENTENNIAL

#### Fitting Observance George Washington's 200th Birth Anniversary to Be Arranged by Local Group

To the citizens of Medford: The U. S. George Washington Bicentennial commission was created by a joint resolution of congress, approved December 2, 1924, to study and recommend a proper celebration in 1932 of the 200th anniversary of the birth of George Washington. As planned, the celebration is to be in exact keeping with the motive expressed by congress, to begin February 22 and continue to Thanksgiving day, November 24, 1932. The theme or purpose is thus expressed: "We cannot all be Washingtons, but our country will be immeasurably elevated and improved by having its citizens carry in their minds and hearts such a knowledge and appreciation of him that their daily lives will be actuated by his example."

In keeping with the desire of congress, the United States commission urges the appointment of state commissions and municipal and society committees to carry out local programs for the nine months' celebration. Rev. C. B. Porter and other local citizens have given the matter thoughtful consideration and believe committee organization and other preliminary work should not be delayed. To this end the following persons have been suggested, and are now confirmed by me, as the Medford City Bicentennial committee, to be responsible for the fitting observance of this anniversary of our first president's birth. This committee will fill vacancies, appoint subcommittees, or increase the personnel of the committee as circumstances and occasion may require.

Luncheon meeting will be held Thursday, October 8, at Hotel Medford for the purpose of organizing and perfecting preliminary plans. (Signed) E. M. WILSON, Mayor.

### MINE DEVELOPER WOULD USE ROAD ON RAY ESTATE

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A. C. Clark, who recently secured control of the Braden mine in the Gold Hill district appeared before the county court this morning, and asked that steps be taken to secure the right to use a road leading to the mine, through the Ray properties, which is the sole means of communication. Another meeting is scheduled for Monday, between parties concerned, to reach an agreement.

Clark told the county court, that he had already "grubstaked" four men, would employ seven to start, and intended to hire a total force of 18 men when the work was enlarged, and more from time to time if conditions justified.

He plans to re-work and develop the property for gold and other valuable metals.

The Braden mine, once one of the best known "diggings" in Southern Oregon, has been idle for several years.
