

SPUD AND FRUIT SHIPMENTS EYED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 25.—(Sp.)—C. R. Jester, deputy state horticulture inspector, from Medford, was in Klamath Falls this week, conferring with County Agent C. A. Henderson.

Jester is checking the violations of the state horticulture laws with regard to the transportation and marketing of unbranded or mis-labeled potatoes, fruits and vegetables.

Particular attention is being paid to the Klamath potato, situation and Rogue River valley fruit shipments in an attempt to aid both the producers and the consumers.

In the past worms, unbranded fruit and cutlets of all kinds have been trucked into Klamath, and sold in competition with good fruits, and the same trucks haul back potatoes in old bags, unbranded, generally of two grade or less, sometimes cuts, and these are sold in competition with legally labeled potatoes, reducing the price of the quality products.

FILIPINO SOLONS ASK INDEPENDENCE

MANILA, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The insular legislature today unanimously adopted a resolution memorializing congress for immediate independence for the Philippines.

The memorial was passed at a joint session of the two houses and was delivered to Secretary of War Patrick J. Hurley, now officially visiting the Philippines, for delivery to congress and President Hoover.

Expressing the belief that separation was the only solution of the Philippine problem, the memorial said that the "independence of America from the Philippines would seem to be as imperative as the independence of the Philippines from America."
