

ASHLAND NORMAL EVENING CLASSES OPEN WEDNESDAY

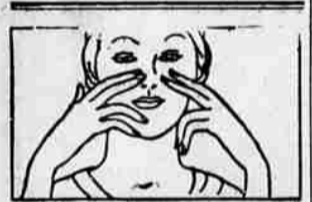
