The period of admission will extend to October 19, when speakers and organizers from the association headquarters will be present for a complimentary dinner here.

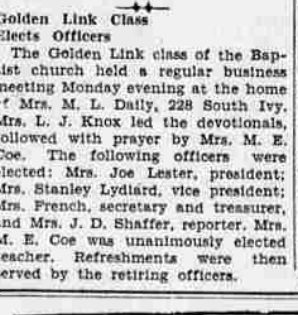
Meeting Saturday For Pan Hellenic
