

UNIVERSITY TAKES 20 TO 0 CONQUEST O'ER WILLAMETTE

Webfoots Work Smoother Than in Opening Setto—Negro Star On Bench and Spears Uses Reserves

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 26.—(AP)—The University of Oregon won its second game of the season here tonight, defeating Willamette University 20 to 0.

The Webfoots worked more smoothly than in their first game last night against Monmouth.

Oregon made all three touchdowns in the first half and in the last two quarters Dr. Clarence Spears, coach, sent in his reserves, Joe Lillard, negro star, did not play.

Willamette threatened late in the fourth quarter when a series of passes put the ball on Oregon's 11 yard line. Kennedy, negro half back, was Willamette's principal ground gainer.

Rotenberg opened the scoring for Oregon after ten minutes of play when he broke through left tackle for 55 yards and a touchdown. Moeller failed to convert.

A long pass, Rotenberg to Gee, back of the goal line, was good for 20 yards and the second counter, Moeller converted.

In the second quarter Gee went through the Willamette line for long gains to carry the ball to the one-foot line and Moeller took it over. Moeller again converted for the extra point.

Willamette held Oregon scoreless in the third quarter and by the end of that period both coaches had sent in numerous reserves.

The teams seemed on fairly even terms in the last quarter. Willamette flashed a strong attack in the middle of the period when Kennedy made three first downs. Late in the quarter Kelly, Oregon safety, muffed a punt and Benjamin of Willamette recovered on the Oregon 20 yard line. The game ended a few minutes later with Oregon in possession of their ball in their own territory.

COUGARS FLASH LAST YEAR STYLE IN GRID OPENER

BOGERS FIELD, PULLMAN, Wash., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Washington State's Cougars overpowered a gallant college of Idaho football team here today, and won 41 to 0.

Coach O. E. Hollingberry used virtually every man of his squad of 50, but in the third period put in a particularly likely first strong combination that steam-rolled three touchdowns in short order. The Idahoans had a good passing attack in the last period and nearly scored before losing the ball on downs.

With Maxwell, fullback, hurling, the Idahoans completed 11 passes out of 25 attempted, while Washington State completed seven out of 16 attempted.

Only one familiar to followers of Hollingberry's coast championship eleven last year appeared on the starting lineup. That was Hein at end. He is a brother of the famous Hein, last year's center. Turk Edwards, Mendenhall and other 1931 regulars were sent in later.

Hollingberry's 1931 edition strongly resembled the championship team of last year in its use of the same type of "power house" play, quickly and expertly executed.

RAIL WORKERS TO ASK SHORT WEEK

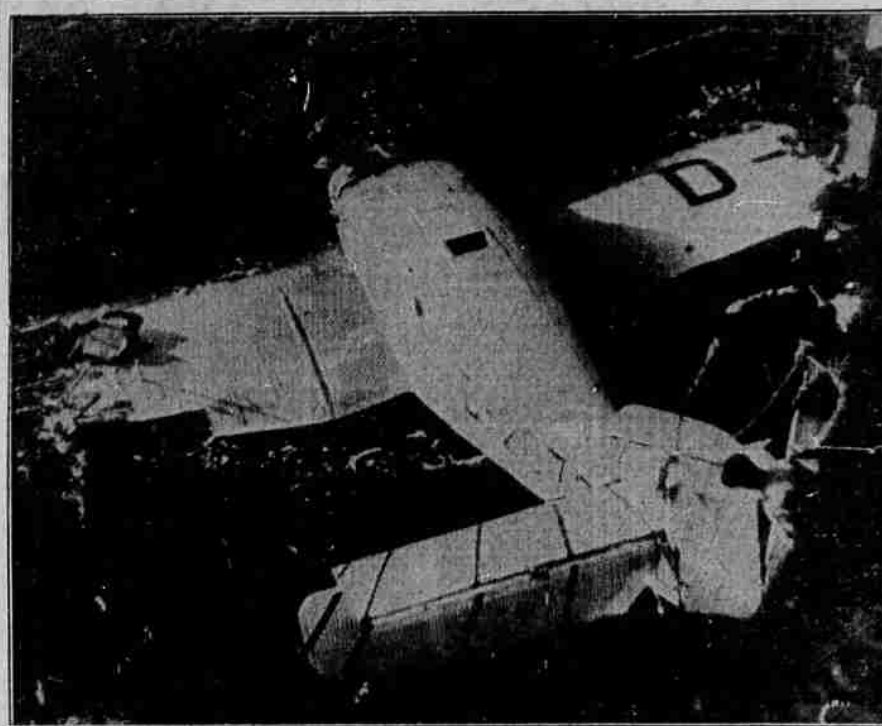
CLEVELAND, Sept. 26.—(AP)—With the idea that a shorter work day and a shorter work week are the only immediate solution for present railroad unemployment, 21 railroad brotherhoods today disclosed they will request congressional action in December on an unemployment relief plan, the details of which are yet to be formulated.

Ten years ago, the brotherhoods won from congress the Adamson bill which gave railroad workers the eight-hour day.

D. B. Robertson, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, who heads a special committee of the 21 bodies, said the specific plan will not be made until a national survey of the problem, now in progress, has been completed.

SEATTLE, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The jury in the second trial of Adolph P. Linden, former president of the defunct Puget Sound Savings and Loan association, charged on four counts with misappropriation of \$116,620, today was dismissed as disagreed. The first jury disagreed in July.

FINANCE MARTS IN CALMER MOOD

Stocks closed heavy out except for a few specialties net losses were moderate and seemed to reflect realising sales. Bonds made irregularly lower levels. Bar silver indicated that speculative activity had been chiefly responsible for its rise, losing most of the week's gain under profit taking in every active trading. Sterling exchange firmed encouragingly and the London stock market, now on a cash basis, steadied.

With the ball on Colorado's 22-yard line Little hit left guard for three yards, leaving the Staters at fourth down and 10 to go. Ward tried a pass which was incomplete.

On consecutive plays both teams were offside. Clements for Colorado tried the left side of the Staters' line for no gain and the Mountaineers kicked. Ward recovered at Colorado's 35-yard line and returned the ball to the 45-yard line. He fumbled and recovered and fumbled again.

Grosvender for Colorado kicked, and Schwammel, O. S. C. right guard blocked it but Grosvender recovered the ball himself and kicked again. Ward took it up to Colorado's 37-yard line.

With only a few minutes to go, Biancone went back at quarter for the Staters, who had the ball on Colorado's 49-yard line. He passed to Moe 34 yards, placing the ball on Colorado's 15-yard line. Biancone went through left tackle for 13 yards to the 2-yard line. Oregon State was penalized 5 yards for holding.

Moe went around right end for 7 yards and a touchdown and Goslin converted, making the score at the third period: Oregon State 18; Colorado 0.

Fourth Period
In the last period Colorado unloaded a forward passing attack after the college had lost the ball trying to get through the Mountaineers' line.

On his 20-yard line, Middlemist, Colorado right half, hurried a long pass to Grosvender on the Oregon State 40-yard line. Grosvender was tackled by Biancone. A short pass was incomplete as was a long one, and the Coloradoans were set back 5 yards. Third down and 15 to go. Middlemist let loose another long forward pass which was intercepted by Little on his 40-yard line and carried to the 49-yard line.

On a reverse play Little took the ball to the 20-yard line where Grosvender got him. Oregon State was penalized 5 yards for being offside.

With only five minutes to play both teams were fighting it out in the middle of the field, Colorado making desperate efforts to turn passing to some account.

FOOD MAD CHINESE ENDANGER LINDY ON MERCY FLIGHT

Plane Believed As "Angel Of Need" and Plane Nearly Swamped By Horde—Misery Depresses Aviator

NANKING, China, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Charles Lindbergh's experimental flight to take doctors and medicines to flood-isolated centers of northern Kiangsu province failed today because the starving Chinese throngs crying for food, rushed the plane.

Declaring the failure "the most heartrending experience of my career," Colonel Lindbergh and his companions sadly returned to Nanking, convinced the only way to place doctors in the flood towns would be to send them with military escorts.

Hingwa was the first halting place. Every available foot of space on the plane had been used for the medical supplies, and as soon as it alighted on the flood waters on the outskirts of the city there was a rush toward it of sampans crowded with starving people, who, seeing the packages on the plane's fuselage, believed food had come at last.

Most of the people in the mob never had seen a plane before, and some regarded the machine as some miraculous intervention. There arose the cries of women and children, and prayers which may have been thanksgiving. Hundreds of hands stretched for the packages visible. The mob paddled to the plane in sampans, tubs, anything floatable, and threatened to sink or at least damage the plane.

The situation looked desperate, and it was evidence the three men were in danger of bodily harm. Liu regained his place in the plane only with great difficulty, leaving the crowds fighting over his packages. The three decided it was hopeless to try to face such an appalling situation, and that it would be better to save the plane.

The American airman said tonight it was not the danger that worried him and his companions as much as the bitter realization of their helplessness in the face of such human misery, with hundreds so near starvation they were unable to understand the humanitarian purposes of this visit.

SURVEY 88 SITES FOR NEW HOMES AT LAKE 'O WOODS

The survey of 88 half-acre lots, 100 by 200 each for summer home sites at Lake o' the Woods was completed last week by Karl Janouch, assistant supervisor of Crater National forest, within the confines of which lie the famous mountain resort and vicinity.

These lots all lie on the east side of the lake back of the present summer homes fronting the lake on that side, and some of them are very choice ones, having exceptionally fine views over the present summer homes, and the lake, with Mt. McClaughlin in the distance.

Inasmuch as the summer homes surrounding and fronting the lake on all sides were taken up long ago and are occupied, already a dozen or more applications have been filed with the Crater National forest, and in the opinion of Supervisor Hugh B. Hamlin, all 88 lots will have been rented from the forest service by next fall, so fast is the growing popularity of the Lake o' the Woods as a resort.

The forest service has been leasing or renting a lot for a summer home site for years at \$10 per annum, and such is the present price, but the price will probably soon be increased to \$15 per year, as \$15 is the charge in all the other national forests for summer home sites, and the regional forester favors making the change.

Of course, a lot is only rented on condition that a suitable summer dwelling be erected thereon. The forest service only stipulates that the building shall be neat and mechanically constructed, and does not care what size it is.

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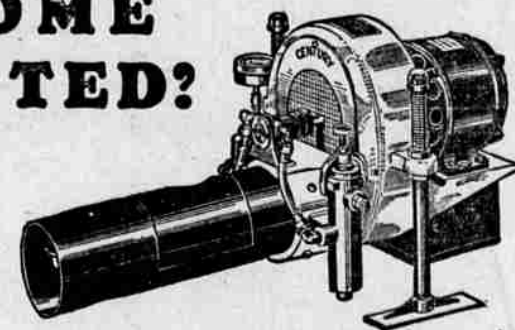
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
