

BUTTER AND EGGS BRING GOOD PRICE; TURKS IN DEMAND

PORTLAND, Sept. 28.—(AP)—In general there was practically no change in the butter market situation for the week's opening. Sales by local creameries are reported generally at full prices. Butterfat is unchanged. Well held prices are reported for eggs by the Pacific Co-op. Competing organizations are reported as making a similar price range after announcement of the local co-op. Some slight weakness is reflected in spots in the eastern cheese trade situation. Demand for live chickens is very good along the wholesale way with practically no change in current values. Demand for dressed turkey remains in excess of current offerings. With further easiness in the live-stock market, values are generally showing reduction in the market for country killed hogs. Veal and lamb continue to show at least full steadiness. More activity is reflected in the market for wine grapes here with very liberal supplies rolling in from California. There is a very slight increase of local muscats and southern Oregon Tokays. Concord are unchanged.
