By Russell Newland. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—(AP)—While members of the Pacific coast conference swung into intensive practice today for important games next Saturday, football fans throughout the far western sector continued to mull over the thrills and spills of last week-end's clashes.

The Gallipoli Gaels of St. Mary's became the most talked of men of football on the coast as the result of their stunning conquest of Southern California's Trojans in Los Angeles last Saturday.

Washington's Huskies, who barely conquered University of Utah, 7-6, in an intercollegiate affair last Saturday, hope to start the conference season in good fashion with a win over the University of Montana.

Stanford university will meet Santa Clara, at Palo Alto, thereby possibly offering some comparison of its strength with California's. In their first appearance Saturday, the Stanford ball-players were held to a scoreless tie by the San Francisco Olympic club.

WORLD SERIES TO PIT SUPER TEAMS OF MAJOR LOOPS

Cardinals and Athletics Far in Front As Season Ends — Both Teams Establish Records for Games Won

Fullerton, Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer) Finishing the 1931 major league season with margins of 13 and 13½ games respectively over the New York teams which wound up in second place, the St. Louis Cardinals and Philadelphia Athletics have given promise through their year's performances of an exciting struggle in the world's series.

The Cardinals finished strongly yesterday, winning from Cincinnati, 6 to 2 and 5 to 3 behind the pitching of Paul Derringer and Sylvester Johnson, and checked in with 101 victories and 54 defeats. The best previous Cardinal mark was 95 won and 50 lost in 1926.

The three-cornered battle in the American league's second division wound up with St. Louis, Boston and Detroit in that order.
