

CHICKENS, TURKS IN GOOD DEMAND PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 29.—(AP) Conditions within the butter market were relatively firm in practically all positions along the coast. There was no change during the late session of the produce exchange. Sales on the exchange and on the open market are being made at the same price, indicating keenness in the call.

While the local make of butter continues to gain, decreases are still shown in offerings from the country.

Trade in the market for eggs continues to reflect well sustained prices at practically all leading points.

Very good demand is reflected in the market for live chickens with prices unchanged generally. Roasting fowls are finding bids as high as 22c.

There is a great need of additional supplies of dressed turkeys to take care of immediate wants of the trade. Prices are showing no change but are well maintained. Young turkeys are especially sought and are slow in arriving.

With recent additional price loss in the livestock market, quotation on country killed hogs is now flat at 9c lb. for best light blockers.

In a small way as high as 11 1/2c lb. or a rise of 1/2c is being obtained for quality lambs in the dressed meat trade. Large retailers are still unwilling to go above 11c generally. Veal shows a favorable call.

PHOENIX YOUTHS STEAL CHICKENS, FARMER CLAIMS

County authorities today rounded up a group of Phoenix youths between 15 and 18 years of age, alleged to have been the cause of considerable petty devilment, the past three months in that vicinity.

Last night, according to a complaint made to Sheriff Ralph Jennings by E. A. Parker, a farmer, they stole nine of his fattest chickens, and hid them in the Phoenix cemetery, where they were found early this morning in a gunnysack behind a tombstone.

Parker told the sheriff that the chicken thieves originally intended to raid the roosts of North Lyons, a neighbor, "but came to my henhouse because they thought the Minorca roosters were fatter." Parker asserts that last fall and winter the thieving was so intense he sold his flocks.

Turkey raisers of the vicinity are keeping a close watch on their fowls. Parker told the sheriff that the bad boy gang has passed beyond the stage "where you can get under their hides with an argument, and they laugh at you if you try to show them the error of their ways." All the losses want drastic action meted.

It is alleged that the chickens are brought to this city, and sold for money "to go to picture shows," and that the gang operates only at night. They are alleged to have committed a long series of depredations, including the theft of a watch, and the breaking of a lock off the Boy Scout headquarters.

Sheriff Jennings investigated the latest raid this morning, and the offenders are scheduled to have a hearing late today.

HONORARY DEGREE FOR DR. SWEENEY TO BE CONFERRED

Dr. Chas. T. Sweeney leaves this evening for New York City, and during his absence will attend the annual meeting of the American College of Surgeons, where there will be conferred upon him, the fellowship degree in the American College of Surgeons.

Dr. Sweeney has been a resident of Medford for fifteen years, and for six years prior to coming here, was a resident of Grants Pass. During all of that time, he has been actively engaged in the practice of medicine in southern Oregon.

Dr. Sweeney served as a representative in the legislature, from Josephine county, a number of years ago, being elected as a democrat, which, in view of the pronounced republican majority, is somewhat of a distinction. However, in conferring of this fellowship degree upon Dr. Sweeney, by the highest organization of surgeons in the United States, is a distinction of which he may well be proud, for this college has the supervision of the medical departments of all of the universities of the United States, as well as the standardization and oversight of all hospitals in the United States.

Dr. Sweeney will be absent about a month, as after receiving the degree he will attend the International Congress of the College of Surgeons and Medicine, at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, after which he will devote some time at the Mayo clinic in Rochester, Minnesota.
