POSTAL EXCHANGE TO GREAT BRITAIN DROPS

The recent change made by England in adopting a silver standard has resulted in a decided decline in exchange and made possible a reduction in the conversion rate in the United States for international money orders. Postmaster Warner is informed by the postoffice department headquarters at Washington, D. C.

The order from Postmaster General Walter Brown to all postmasters of the United States says in part: "The rate for money orders issued in the United States and payable in Great Britain and northern Ireland, Irish Free State, New Zealand and Union of South Africa shall be at the rate of \$4.40 for the pound sterling."

The former postal rate was \$4.87 for the pound sterling.
