

PORTLAND RUSHES CAR OF CHICKENS FOR 'FRISCO MART

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A carload of chickens, believed to be the first full load of live fowls to leave Portland, is being rushed to San Francisco by fast freight to supply a demand there. A surplus here was the cause. The shipment consisted of about 4,000 Leghorn hens.

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Despite all the talk of interested parties in trying to force a reduction in the price of butter during a late season of the Produce Exchange, the fact remains that no accumulations of stock are shown in this territory. Market for eggs is quoted firm at the further advance of 1c quoted for extras and standards by the Pacific co-ops. The new list is generally quoted by others. Demand for turkeys continues firm and supply is still inadequate to take care of needs of both old and new crop. Best young toms are holding snug at 35c lb. Generally average tone is reflected in the market for potatoes at both primary and consuming points. There is no speculative activity whatever at leading primary points.

COCA COLA ENJOYS PROSPEROUS PERIOD

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Coca Cola company today mailed shareholders \$2,000,000 representing the quarterly dividend of \$1.75 per share plus an extra dividend of 25 cents per share of common stock. The dividend payment retained the stock on an 88 basis. Officials said that the quarter ending today has been one of the biggest, if not the biggest, in the company's history.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad today declared a dividend of \$1 a share on the common stock. In the two previous quarters dividends of \$1.25 each were paid, prior to which the stock was on a \$7 annual basis.

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BELLVIEW GRANGE TOLD TAX BURDEN VOTED BY PEOPLE

Joining the state wide movement for retrenchment and reduction of taxes, the Bellview Grange held an open meeting last night and solicited the opinions and information of J. B. Coleman, county assessor, and Attorney Frank Newman and T. J. Enright regarding county taxes and the County Health Unit. More than 150 Grangers and other interested persons attended the session. Sometime ago the Bellview Grange passed a resolution asking for removal of the health department and other county offices. Their action was followed by contrary resolutions on the part of about 10 Granges of the county and the meeting last night was apparently called to make further investigation of the situation. Attorney Newman presented records of the health unit, which show the valuable service it has given the county. Approaching the question from both angles he also told the farmers if they do not consider this service worth the price they are paying for it they should discontinue with the department, or in case they feel that someone else could perform a better service they should ask for another staff. No action was taken regarding the original resolution of the Grange. Attorney Enright, who represented Mrs. Lydia King, ex-county nurse, in her case against Dr. B. C. Wilson of the health department, described the hearing to the Grangers. Assessor Coleman, who presented the county tax budget, gave the Grangers a short history of the origin of taxes, showing that they have been voted by the people, who if they want lower taxes must abide by a retrenchment program. They have demanded better roads, better schools and other facilities and as long as they have them, he pointed out, must pay for them. Plans for the new county court house to be constructed were also discussed and many questions asked as to the number of rooms to be included and the department to be housed in each room. There was no one present with a copy of the plans so most of the Grangers' questions went unanswered.

TILLER TO TRAIL ROAD WILL COST \$64,600, REPORT

County Engineer Paul Rynning today filed a report with the county court estimating the cost of the proposed Tiller-Trail road, at \$64,600. The heaviest item in the costs is shale surfacing estimated at \$22,500. Other costs are fixed as follows: Common excavating, \$15,000; rock work, \$13,125; clearing and grubbing, \$8,000. Small bridges, \$1,500; culvert pipe, \$4,000; engineering, \$3,000. A law passed by the last session of the legislature, requires that estimates of costs of all road work be filed before the work is voted upon, or started. The county court will probably issue an order that a special road levy election be held next November. The 23 property owners effected by the special levy have petitioned the county court that a special election for the special levy be called. The distance of the road in Jackson county from the Trail junction with the Crater Lake highway to the summit of the Umpqua mountains is 12.7 miles. The federal bureau of public roads and Douglas county have been working all summer on the northern end of the road.

taken, the original highway map of Oregon should be completed.

Talks To Parents

Bored Parents
(By Alice Judson Peale)

Two girls whose home apparently offers them everything they could desire are restless, bored and unhappy. With a delightful house where their friends are always welcome, with a roadster at their disposal, with plenty of pleasant young people to play with, they alternate periods of feverish social activity with times of inertia when nothing seems worth doing.

Except when the radio is playing and the living room full of their friends, they cannot bear to stay home, unless it be to sleep till noon. Since both children are gifted and intelligent, such purposeless, unenjoyable living argues the absence of a dynamic ideal in their elders. In this instance the father is so much away from home that he does not count in his life.

The mother fails to furnish the necessary pattern for emulation. She, too, is restless, now busy with purposeless activity, now for long periods beset with a sense of futility.

A modern and efficient housekeeper, she has long empty afternoons when the rounds of bridge and shopping and tea have been exhausted, and when a novel and a box of chocolates are hardly enough to stand between her and a sense of emptiness. We parents owe it to our children to find a sustaining interest which will give significance to daily living. Where the demands of money and home-making are not so great that they occupy all of our time, our use of leisure should be such as to give our children a feeling that the world is full of unexplored interests and possibilities for enjoyment.

We need hobbies and vocations and the wholesome state of mind they engender if we are to furnish our children with the impetus to go ahead toward worthwhile goals.

An exhibition of "blind" flying was given today at the local airport by Russell Cunningham, general superintendent of the Pacific Air Transport, and Frank Anderline, pilot, for the entertainment of the Lions club, which had luncheon in the hangar building.

Closed in by a hood, which shuts out all the outside world Anderline took the plane over the valley, piloting it through instruction of instructions alone, after it left the runway. The radio used for communication with the ground is also used as a means of receiving reports from the instructor under the new system.

Each time the plane swooped low over the field the brave Lions edged toward cover and none of them requested a life in the "blind" flying expedition.

Mr. Cunningham is going over the Pacific Air Transport system giving "blind" flying lessons.
