GABBY CONFIDENT CARDINALS CARRY PUNCH THIS YEAR

St. Louis Mentor Not So Sure About Strategy, But Hopes Fighting Spirit Will Win the Championship

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 30.—(AP) It is an old baseball axiom that no strategy is quite so effective as a wallop out of the park. Babe Ruth demonstrated this well known fact in the celebrated victory of "brute force" over the "mule mind" of John McGraw a number of years ago.

The theory and practice of the home run is still good strategy. It is relied upon by the world champion Athletics just as much as they depend upon the sagacity of their 36-year-old pilot, Connie Mack, and his able lieutenants, Eddie Collins and William (Kid) Gleason, in the struggle that starts tomorrow with the St. Louis Cardinals.

"We Can Outplay 'Em!"
"The best strategy we can employ," Gabby Street says, "is to go out there and light the A's off their feet from the drop of the bat. I don't know whether we can outsmart 'em but I feel confident we can outplay 'em this time."

The spirit of the National league champions is one of their strong points, in Street's opinion, but he knows this will not suffice without the proper strategy in handling his pitchers or without reverberations from the big bats of Jim Bottomley and Chick Hafey.

In the 1930 battle of wits and base hits, the Athletics had much better of it. They upset the Cards and Burleigh Grimes in the very first game when Joe Boley pulled the "sneaky play" with the speedy Haas on third base. They accomplished Burleigh's second downfall with a potent wallop from Jimmy Fox's bat into the bleachers.

Collins, Gleason smart
No manager in baseball has a smarter pair of advisers than Collins and Gleason. They have been thru the wars. They are quick thinkers in any emergency where one seemingly insignificant move may determine the whole tide of battle. Nothing on the field escapes them, if it slips the notice of Mack himself.

They outnumber, at least, the Cardinal combination of Street and Frisch, whether or not they cast a deciding influence.

Pitching strategy was at least 60 per cent of the 1930 battle. Here, too, the A's have an advantage with Grove and Earnshaw apparently in the best of health, whereas Jesse Haines, veteran Cardinal mainstay, is out of the picture with a lame shoulder.

If the Cardinals should gamble with their powerful youngsters, Paul Derringer, and whip Lefty Grove in the opening game, the rebound to their spirits might prove decisive. This again, it is a case where baseball may destroy the best-laid plan of pitching tactics. Grove was no puzzle to the Yanks his last time out.

The racket has been settled in several localities during the past few years by the ranchers converting their property into game preserves, which is much better from the birds' viewpoint. The season opens October 15 to continue through October 31. The bag limit is four pheasants in any one day, or eight in any seven consecutive days. But no more than one female pheasant can be taken in any seven consecutive days. The quail season is open during the same period and it is hoped that the feathers on one of the latest Eugene hats will not be taken for a bird.

The duck season by federal law will not open until November, contrary to the state law, which provides for open season Thursday. Duck hunters are warned to remember the latest ruling and keep out of the marshes for a while.

San Francisco and Oakland were the same distance apart today in their race to win the second half of the Coast league season as both teams won their games last night. The Seals lead with Oakland second. The A's dimmed the chances of Los Angeles as a contender for second half honors by defeating the Angels 6-5 last night to shove them another game behind the A's in third place.

All of the Oakland runs were scored in the sixth inning when Jess Petty, Angel pitcher, was hammered out of the box.
The Seals downed Seattle 9-2 as Sam Gibson hurled his 25th victory of the year. San Francisco knocked Kallio for 18 hits, punching them in the first, fourth and seventh innings. Hollywood turned back the Portland Beavers by a score of 5-3.

The Stars tapped Poseel for 10 of their 11 hits and all of their five runs in three innings.
Sacramento took the Mission Reds 9-2 and took the first of five victories necessary to assist the Senators away from the league cellar.

Grove participated in 41 games this season, won 31 and lost 4. He possesses blinding speed, with a sharp breaking curve, plus seven years of experience with the Athletics, including two world series.
Paul Derringer, playing his first year with the Cardinals, 25 years old, born in Springfield, Ky. Derringer was in 35 games this season, won 18 and lost 8. He is a right hander, with a long sweeping delivery, good change of pace, with an excellent curve and good speed. He is a rangy youngster, 6 feet 3½ inches tall and weighing 215 pounds.

It was a hard struggle, however, and Kennedy was handicapped by never having fought a left hander before. Kennedy's great boxing ability stood him in need in the later rounds when Byrne went after him with terrific lefts to the head and jaw. Byrne weighed 209½ pounds, Kennedy 190.

Johnny Hansen took a sensational one-round knockout over Jimmy McCarthy, San Francisco. Flats flew furiously for one minute and ten seconds, but Hansen landed the one that counted first. It required five minutes to revive McCarthy.

The winner of the football game here next Saturday afternoon between Marshfield and Medford high will have as much right as any of the early state title aspirants to lay claim to championship possibilities. Both are big, fast squads, with speedy ball carriers. The Coos Bay team will have the edge in experience, and they have already announced titular aspirations.
The locals make no claim to state championship consideration this year, but serve notice they want to be considered in 1932. With a lot of two-year lettermen and the Burgher system firmly impregnated by then, they will be nothing to sneeze at. As they stand today, they average around 180 pounds, and will not be any lighter in another year.

Pirates Out to Win.
The game Saturday is one of the games Marshfield wants to win, as it will give them prestige, not to mention revenge for some outlandish thumpings in the past.
Two or three of the Portland high schools already have their eye on a post-season tilt and Salem, with most of last year's players back, is laying plans for the same thing. The Portland schools have knocked over Chehalis, Kelso and way point squads. This week they start playing each other. After Thanksgiving when they start chipping: "We have defeated the best teams in Portland and Clark and Clatsop counties, Wash. Salem high is going to answer 'How about us?'"

Eugene high also has titular bees in their bonnet, and play Salem Armistice Day for the Willamette valley honors. Albany or Corvallis may come along and spoil the stratagem.
