

WEATHER FAVORS HUGE ATTENDANCE FOR OREGON FAIR

All Records Expected to
Fall Today—Governor's
Derby Feature On Track
—Judging Continuing

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 30.—(AP) All attendance records for this year and recent years are expected to be shattered at the Oregon state fair today, which is Salem day, and during which time the governor's derby will be the feature at the horse races. Clear and warm weather greeted early fair crowds, and the trek to the grounds started long before the scheduled events took place.

Last year about 30,000 persons attended the fair on Salem day, which is considered the best attended day during the week each year. The record on this day during past years was reported as 48,000.

Rain yesterday resulted in a heavy track for the opening race event. The governor's derby will be the 1-16 mile race for which a purse of \$500 is offered. Two harness races and two other running races will complete the race program. The purses today aggregate \$1800.

The night horse show tonight will feature as an added attraction, fancy riding by Frank Studnicka, Pendleton roundup champion. Studnicka was injured Monday night when the horse he was riding plunged to the ground with him. Last night's show had as an added attraction a revival of the hitching post period, with ancient carriages predominating.

Judging continues. Judging in all divisions continued today, and it is expected that most of the livestock judging and those in the boys' and girls' club work divisions will be completed by tomorrow.

Holstein senior and grand champion bull honors went to William Bishop, Chumbeum, Wash.; Hays and company, Calgary, Canada, took junior champion bull and senior and grand champion cow and S. B. Hall, Troutdale, won junior champion heifer in this class.

Jersey judges yesterday awarded senior and grand champion bull to Estella A. Fenne, Portland, an old-time winner; and junior and grand champion cow to Lion farm, Portland; junior champion bull went to V. J. Hutcheson, Mt. Vernon, and senior champion cow to Henry Thompson and son, Canada.

In short horns, C. J. Broughton, Dayton, Wash., took senior and grand champion bull with Wheatland Lorne and senior and grand female champion with Wheatland Sylvia; J. G. Grimble, Gardfield, Wash., took junior champion bull and junior champion female.

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PHOENIX YOUTHS WARNED AGAINST ERROR OF WAYS

Francis Johnson, 14, who Tuesday night locked his father and mother in an auto camp cabin near Ashland, and departed for his former home at Hawthorn, Calif., in the family auto, was returned to his parents by juvenile judge Alex Sparrow, this morning upon his promise to be a "better boy" in the future. The youth also took his father's purse. He was apprehended at the Elakyou summit checking station.

The court said, "This is the first time I ever heard of a boy who would steal from his mother and leave her stranded in a strange place."

Young Johnson gave as a reason for his action, "I didn't like it here."

Eugene Coates, 16, Eugene Schrerrer, 16, and Bruce Wilson, 15, Phoenix high school lads, charged with stealing chickens from E. A. Parker, and alleged to have committed a series of petty depredations in the Phoenix district, were sentenced to the state reform school at Salem, and paroled to the county court, with the understanding that a second appearance will mean enforcement of the sentence.

COUNTY OFFICERS CONTINUE PROBE IN FOSTER DEATH

The investigation into the death of Ed Foster, Jacksonville prospector killed while on a trip into the woods, in the Bush area, three weeks ago has not been abandoned, according to District Attorney George A. Codding. Foster was shot and killed, and the exact manner has never been definitely determined, although the authorities hold strongly to the theory that he was accidentally slain for a deer.

The district attorney said this morning, there are a "couple more angles that need to be cleared up," and that progress was being made in this direction.

The authorities hold that Foster and companions journeyed into the hills on a deer hunting trip before the season opened and that he was accidentally shot for a deer and the exact facts hidden, to evade prosecution for hunting out of season.

It has been established that Foster had an agreement to furnish jerky on a commercial basis, the proceeds to be used as a "grubstake" for a mining venture.

The authorities place no credence in the suicide or accident theories, or the report that threats had been made against him.

Former Grants Pass Cleric to Be Bishop

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The election of the Rev. F. B. Bartlett, former Oregon Episcopal priest, as bishop of the missionary district of North Dakota, was announced by Bishop W. T. Sumner of Portland in a telegram received here today.

Bishop Bartlett was ordained here in 1908 and served two years as rector at Grants Pass. His election was by the general convention in Denver.

DANES SUSPEND GOLD STANDARD IN HURRY

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Danish government suspended the gold standard today by rushing the necessary legislation through both houses of parliament.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Bulgarian national bank rate was raised today from eight and one-half per cent to nine and one-half per cent.
