

JOHN OLWELL, A BOOM DAY FIGURE, TO FINAL REWARD

John D. Olwell, a picturesque and aggressive leader of the city in the "boom days," and a pioneer of the fruit industry in the Rogue River valley, died in a sanitarium today at Oakland, Calif., following a long illness, according to word received by Mrs. J. F. Reddy. He was about 65 years of age. In his time he was one of the best known men of southern Oregon, and well known and remembered by scores of older residents.

Olwell spent his early boyhood and young manhood in the valley, moving here with his parents from the east. With his father, for a number of years he operated a flour mill at Phoenix. Later, his father planted what is known as Snowy Butte orchards, near Central Point. He was one of a family of four brothers and three sisters.

Olwell was a practical orchardist, and well acquainted with land in Jackson county. He figured in many of the large orchard deals consummated in 1910 and 1911, when engaged in the realty business. At one time he was associated with William M. Holmes, and later with J. E. (Mose) Barkdill. He was a genial, free-handed man and unflinching worker in his field.

About twenty years ago he moved to New York City, where he engaged in the brokerage and promotion business. Later he moved to Florida, and when his health broke, moved to California. He has been failing for four years.

He survived by his wife, Mrs. May Olwell, relative and a large circle of friends. He enjoyed a wide acquaintance on the Pacific coast.

Funeral arrangements have not been definitely decided upon, but it is understood he will be brought here for the final rites and interment.

Walter L. Hayward, associate regional scout executive of region 11, will be in Medford Sunday and Monday to confer with local officials. He will address a meeting of scouters in Ashland at noon and at Grants Pass in the evening on Monday.

Plans for the numerous activities to be sponsored during the fall and winter season by the Business and Professional Women's club were discussed today noon at the regular luncheon session of the club at the Hotel Holland. The Haloween dance—one of the first affairs to grace the season, was the leading topic.

Musical entertainment for the session was furnished by Misses Elsie Brown and Winifred Walker and Mrs. Clarice Spohn, who sang two numbers to ukulele accompaniment.

POSTAL VESTIBULE MAILING PLATFORM CONTRACT STARTED

The work of enlarging the mail vestibule and widening the driveway of the Medford postoffice by R. I. Stewart & Sons, which firm obtained the contract with its bid of \$31,000, began yesterday noon, within an hour after Colonel Stewart had received a telegram from the supervising architect of the treasury that

all matters connected with the bid were O.K. The entire work is to be completed within 45 days, according to the contract.

The first work being done is the excavating of the driveway in the rear and on the west side of the federal building, so as to permit of the widening of the postoffice loading platform. This work progressed fast yesterday afternoon and today with a steam shovel and a number of workmen with trucks on the job. As fast as the dirt was excavated it was hauled away in trucks.

When the excavation work is done the building of the new concrete driveway will be started, and then the enlarging of the mail vestibule and loading platform will be begun.
